# WHAT LOCAL PEOPLE

To the Editor of The Clarkston News: On March tenth last an unsigned irticle appeared in your paper, which, apparently, roused the indignation of fellow citizens, and prompted the vitriolic attack on the undersigned.

Permit me to inform the general public that the reason I did not sign that article was because I did not write it. I did, however, furnish the legal references quoted therein, and heartily agree with the article as written, and will back it up, though I do not want credit for writing it.

In order that the public may not be misled by the misformation published in the issue of March 17th, I will say that the Township Clerk has a set of the Complied Laws of Michigan for 1929, identical with that from which some of the material for the article of March 10th was taken.

How is it, then, that the author of the article of March 17th could deliberately attempt to mislead the readers of this paper? Possibly a dictionary would be of some assistance in determining the difference between a fine and a forefeiture. Failure to qualify does not constitute a misdemeanor-therefore, there would be no fine, and no court costs. The un-qualified candidate would simply owe the Township \$10.00 and if the Township Board should collect it. every cent of it would go to the Townhip, and to no one else.

In April, 1932, three of those "IN-NOCENT OLD MEN" referred to in the article of March 17th were elected as constables. They were: Ward Dunston, Joseph Seeterlin, and Will-iam Adams. Poor old fellows! It grieves me to think of their suffering injustice. Happily, however, search of the statutes reveals that Section 1042, Complied Laws of 1929 provides that the Township Board may in its discretion, authorize the payment of Constables, bond from the General Fund. So the poor old fellows were never in any danger at all. What a relief- However, the Board didn't see fit to furnish their bonds, within the ten day limit, and they didn't qualify, and there you are.

How odd! And yet, the Republican you advise? ballot contains the names of two candidates who have been elected since that time. Does this indicate that the Dear G. H. 'joke" is to be carried into this election or will the new Township Board see fit to furnish their bonds for them, if elected?

Out of over six hundred qualified egistered voters, only about one hundred fifty attended the caucuses. Den't let this happen at the election. All you voters get out and vote. If you live outside of town, and haven't a car of your own, he careful whom you thumb for a ride, as the intentions of both yourself and the driver might be misconstrued, especially if he happened to be a candidate. But get there somehow, and when you go to the polls, vote for somebody who CAN

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
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

Drayton Plains was thrown into adness last Saturday afternoon when word came of the death of Ernestine Colemon at the University Hospital, Ann Arbor at 1:50 o'clock, Saturday afternoon. 


