During the winter of 1932 an Act as approved through Congress by the President authorizing the distribution of surplus of wheat in the form of flour to the needy and distressed people of the United States. The American National Red Cross and its branches and chapters was selected as the organization through which distribution should be made, in cooperation with local public welfare

agencies. During the period from April 30, 1932, to approximately July 1, 1933, the Oakland County public welfare agencies received and distributed a total of 24,075 barrels of flour and 87,500 pounds of cracked wheat. At the wholesale prices prevailing during that period it is estimated that






