BOND ISSUE VOTE

Result Will Affect Welfare Load For Coming Year

On April 30 Michigan taxpayers will go to the polls to vote on a \$38,-000,000 public works bond issue, designed by the legislature as a workrelief measure for next fall and winter. Under terms of the bill, a \$19,-000,000 institutional building program and an \$18,000,000 highway onstruction program would be provided.

"The civil works program ceased on March 31. Some program, outside of direct dole, must be devised for next winter. The P. W. A. program offers one way out. Compare the \$38,000,000 required for the public works plan with the \$36,218,388 spent for C. W. A. last year. Then, remember that the P. W. A. would provide a permanent, constructive program impossible under the hurnature of C. W. A." This is what Tracy W. Southworth, chairman of the Employment Recovery Coun-

cil, has stated. The loan from the federal government is to be repaid over a period of 30 years for the institutional building program and 15 years for the highway projects. Ordinary revenues. of the corporation tax and the gasoline and weight taxes would be used partly for that purpose.
