Among those giving short addresses were Judge Harry J. Beardsley,

LL. D. of Waterbury, Conn.; Hartness Beardsley, of Springfield, Vt., who had just returned from a National Geographic expedition to Alaska; Henry Curtis Beardsley, naturalist, of Perry, O.; James Wallace Beardsley, engineer, of Syracuse, N. Y., and George A. Beardsley, of Newark, N. J.

William Beardsley, the progenitor of the family in America, was born in England in 1605 and lived at St. Albans, Hertfordshire, at the time of leaving England. On April 2, 1635, he with his wife and three children sailed from London on the ship Planter, and settled near Boston, where he became a land owner. In 1639, in company with several others who came over on the same ship, he moved from there in order to better financial conditions and founded the town of Stratford, Conn.

The colonial records reveal that William Beardsley was elected to the General Court of Hartford in 1645 and served eight terms. In the old colonial documents he is often spoken of as "the goodman Beardsley" and these documents give further evidence that he and his four sons filled an important place in the early history of New England.

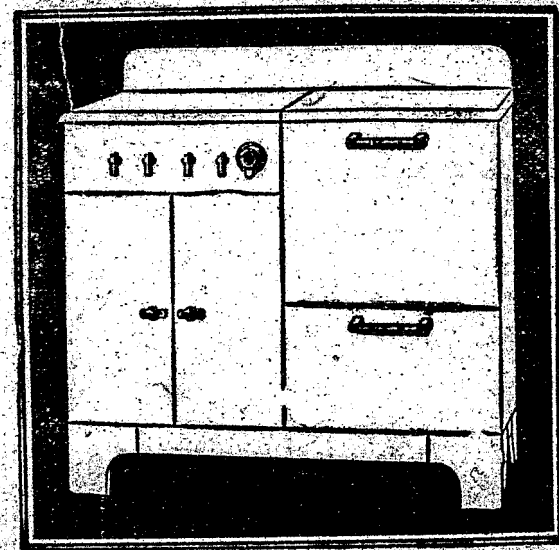
