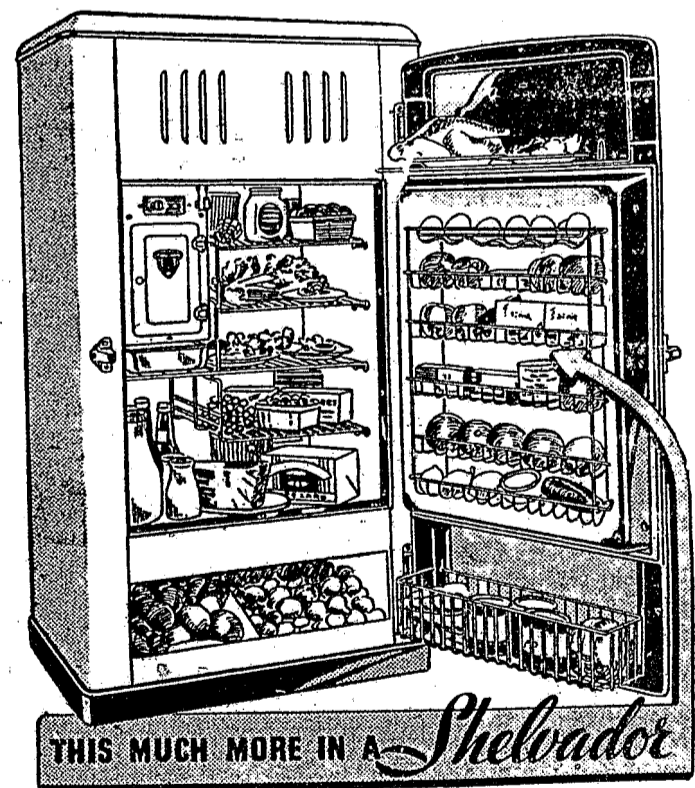

BOND QUESTION IS UP TO THE VOTERS

They Will Decide Matter of New Office Building

The Board of Supervisors having voted to submit to the electors of the county the question of bonding the county in the sum of \$129,000.00 for the erection of an office building, the

people are entitled to know all the facts in order that they may be able to vote intelligently.

The total cost of the new building would be \$280,000.00, of which amount the Federal government would contribute \$106,000.00. This would leave for the county to pay \$174,000.00 plus \$45,000.00 interest over a period of 15 years. The average yearly payment would be \$11,160.00.

The county is now paying \$10,000 a year rental for offices, plus the expense of lights and janitor service. It is estimated that the maintenance cost of the new building would be less than the present rental, and it is also claimed that rents are bound to be advanced within a short time.

Before the election the voters will be given adequate opportunity to inform themselves in every particular and it is their duty, and should be to their advantage, to do so.

During a 12-month period that included parts of 1933 and 1934, a stamp tax was paid on upward of 45,350,000 decks of playing cards in the United States.

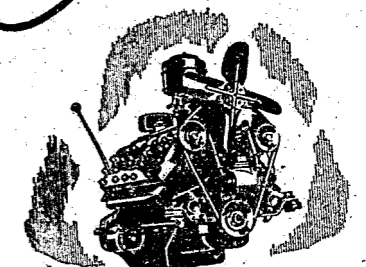
