Much has been said about the Welfare question. Probably much more Il be said. Certainly there are two les to the question. Just as certain there are "Chiselers" of the welthere are also an unfortunate who need assistance in their exence in this world. Last week this column presented some of the viewpoints against welfare and presented them in the perhaps light attitude of public opinion which feels that any kind of assistance is a graft. This week let us call to your attention the viewpoint of those needing aid.

In the first place, to get on the welfare you must run the gamut of public opinion and admit that you are unable to care for yourself (certainly no easy thing if you have been a self respecting citizen prior to the emergency). Your application will be considered on the same basis as the applicant who considers welfare a racket, which does not tend to raise your self-esteem. You, your family, your home, and all personal matters will become an open book, public record, for the education of the curious. Then if your application is passed, you and your family will receive 17 cents a day, apiece, to enjoy yourself . . . \$4.76 a week, if you are married and have two chil-. \$4.76 a week, if . a sum about equal to a trip to Pontiac, two tickets to a dance or show, and a bite afterwards (something that the average man lucky enough to be earning money considers a necessity). Nor does the pleasure of being on the welfare end here. If you do not accept a temporary job, you are lazy, although the acceptance of such a job may take your name off the list making it harder, if not impossible, to get back after the job is done. In addition to this, both before and after the reign of the ill-fated N. R. A., the "Welfare Case" has been and is subject to that type of employer who is making a profit of the depression by offering a few cents a week more than the aid and pocketing the difference between what he is paying and what a reasonable pay would be, threatens to report the case if the "Case" quits work. All Will Be Taken Over by the Counties by April 1 Next

Six more months and the township road system will be a relic of a bygone era in Michigan.

Funeral services for the township road, one of the oldest of Michigan conditions of farmers, according to institutions, will take place April 1, the economic department at Michigan 1936. respective counties. There will be little mourning, however, when this once-robust road system is no more. To accomplish the transition counties have been receiving an increased allocation from state highway revenues yearly. The allocation which started at \$2,000,000 in 1982 and has increased \$500,000 every year was allocated by the Legislature on the basis of township road mileage in 1931. Most of the counties say that their allocation is sufficient to take care of the
