CHARLIE CHAPLIN'S NEWEST PICTURE

Coming to the Holly Theatre for Showing of Three Days

Two years in production, "Modern Times", Charlie Chaplin's new comedy, comes to the Holly Theatre for three days starting Sunday.

Half that time was taken for a complete preparation of the script. Shooting from a prepared script is an innovation with Chaplin, and is responsible for the fact that only ten months were required for the actual camera work instead of the usual eighteen months to two years.

The story, which was written by Chaplin, is that of a factory worker in a huge steel plant, going through a mechanical routine of tightening bolts on a moving track. This nightmare of cold shining steel, mammoth dynamos, pulleys, levers and switches is said to provide a veritable paradise for Chaplin's inimitable brand of comedy.

Charlie doesn't last long on this job, however, and the blue denims of the working man soon give way to the more familiar baggy trousers, huge shoes, hat and stick of the universally beloved little tramp. From then on Charlie's life is a series of difficulties which keep him hopping in and out of jobs and in and out of jail. But a happy ending is provided by the girl, a beautiful gamine of the waterfront, played by Paulette Goddard, Charlie's lovely new leading lady.

The first sequence in a Chaplin film to be shot directly in sound will be seen and heard in "Modern Times". It is in this scene that Charlie performs a pantomime of the old French song, "Titina", and comes closest to letting his voice be heard from the screen. The remainder of the film, in accordance with the comedian's tradition, was photographed as a silent, with synchronized sound and musical effects added later.

"Modern Times", which has been pronounced Chaplin's greatest and funniest film to date, was also produced and directed by the comedian, who wrote the music as well.

GOOD FRIDAY, EASTER SERVICES AT CRANBROOK

Friday of this week being Good Friday, there will be held in Christ Church Cranbrook from twelve noon until three o'clock in the afternoon, the traditional three hour service. It consists of seven meditations on the last words of Jesus by Rev. W. Hamilton Aulenbach, organ meditations by William Hall Miner, prayers, hymns and psalms. The carillon bells are tolled before and after this service. The Easter Sunrise Service is held in this church on Sunday morning, April 12, at seven o'clock. It is preceded by a carillon recital at six-thirty, at six-forty by the brass quartet of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra playing Bach chorales and Easter hymns from the roof of the west porch on the outside of the church and from the west balcony inside of the church. Special music will be sung by the adult choir at this sunrise celebration of the Holy Communion. At nine o'clock the annual children's service known as the Resurrection Festival will be held. It begins with a procession of all the children's choirs about the church. Following the pageant which is a part of the service, all the children and adults in the congregation come forward to see the empty tomb where fresh cut flowers are distributed to all the children. At eleven o'clock there will be a celebration of the Holy Communion with special music by the choir and a sermon by the Rev. W. Hamilton Aulenbach. In the afternoon at the four o'clock vesper service August Richard Maelbergh, the well-known Belgian organist, will play his Easter recital. The people of all denominations are invited to attend any of these services.
