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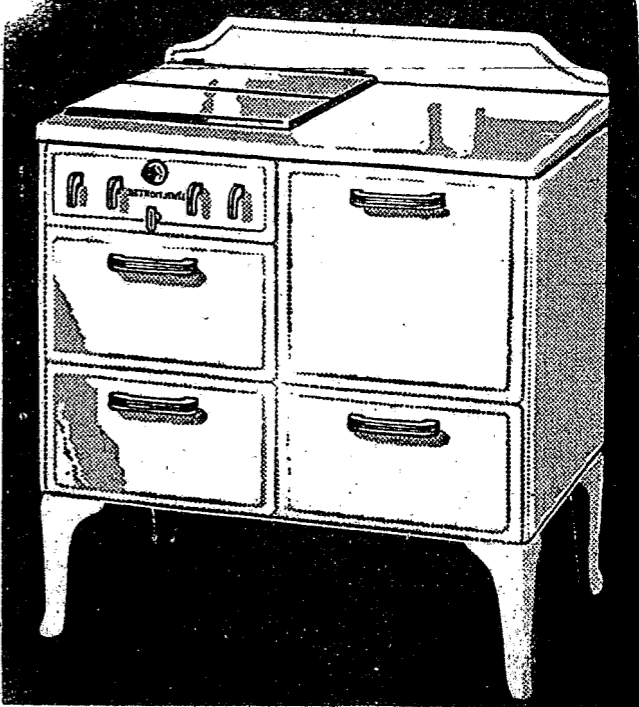
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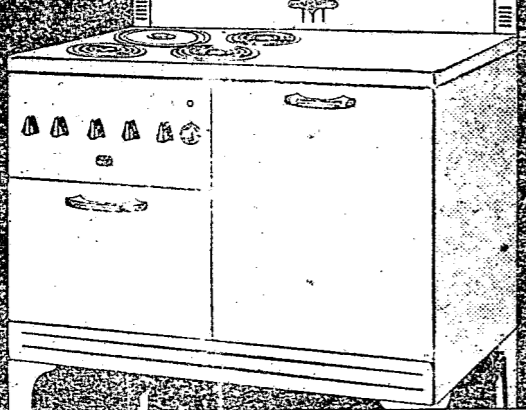

Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Bellows have returned home after spending the winter in Florida.

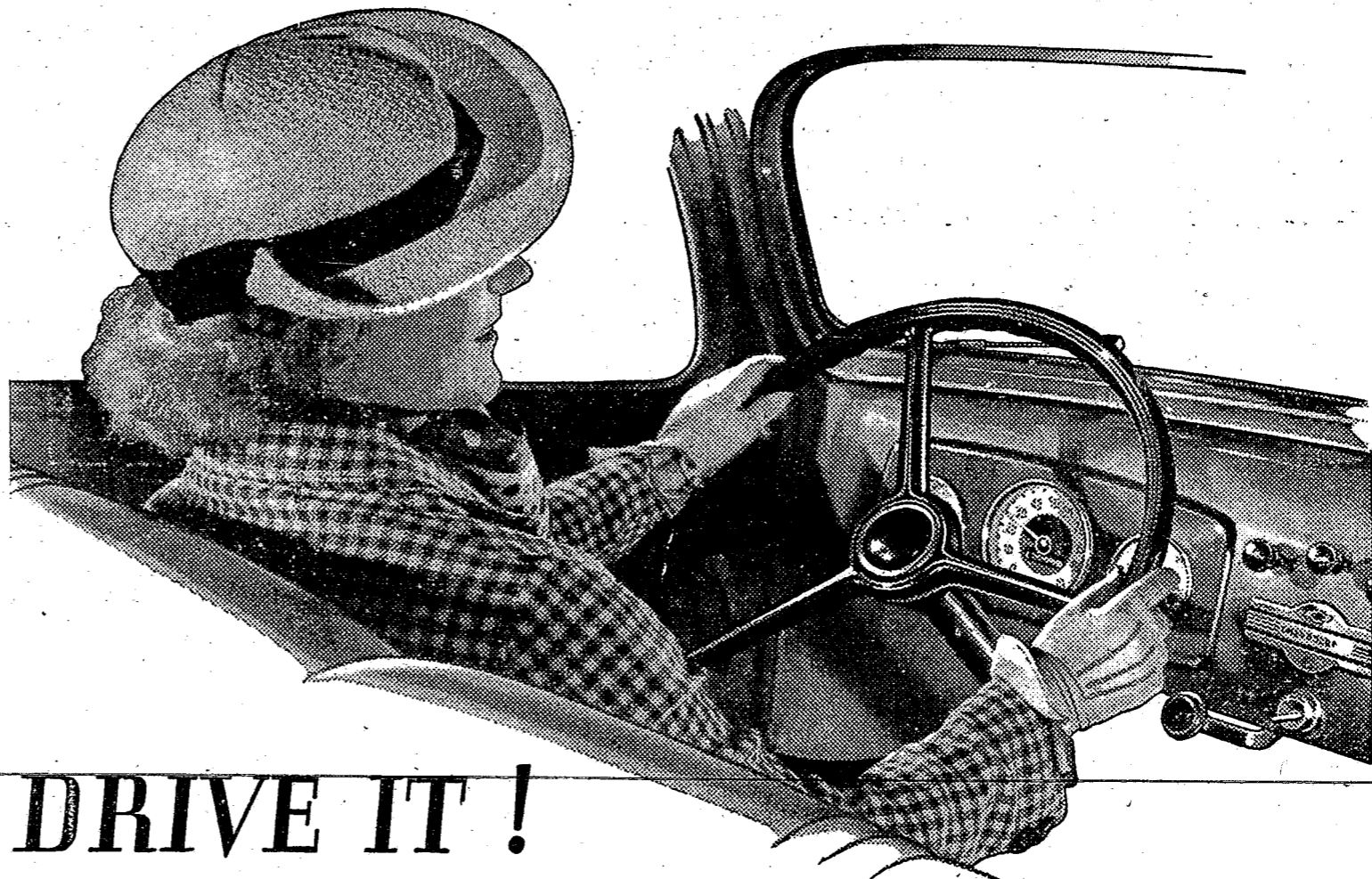
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
