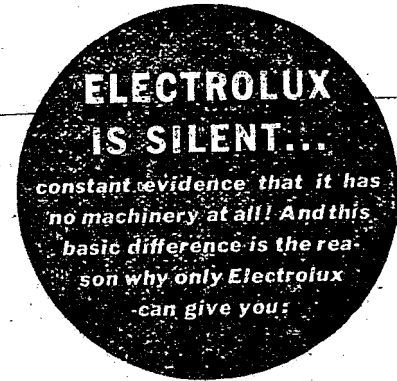

Rev. Howard Jewell announces that the Jewell grocery will be closed on Sundays starting this Sunday.

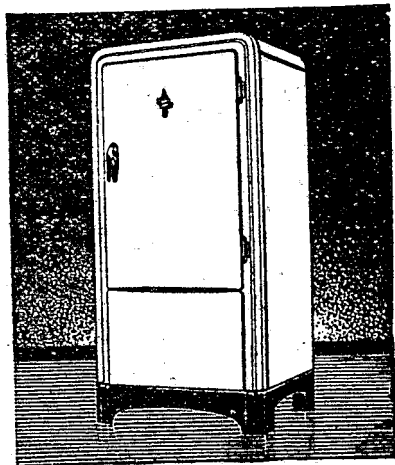

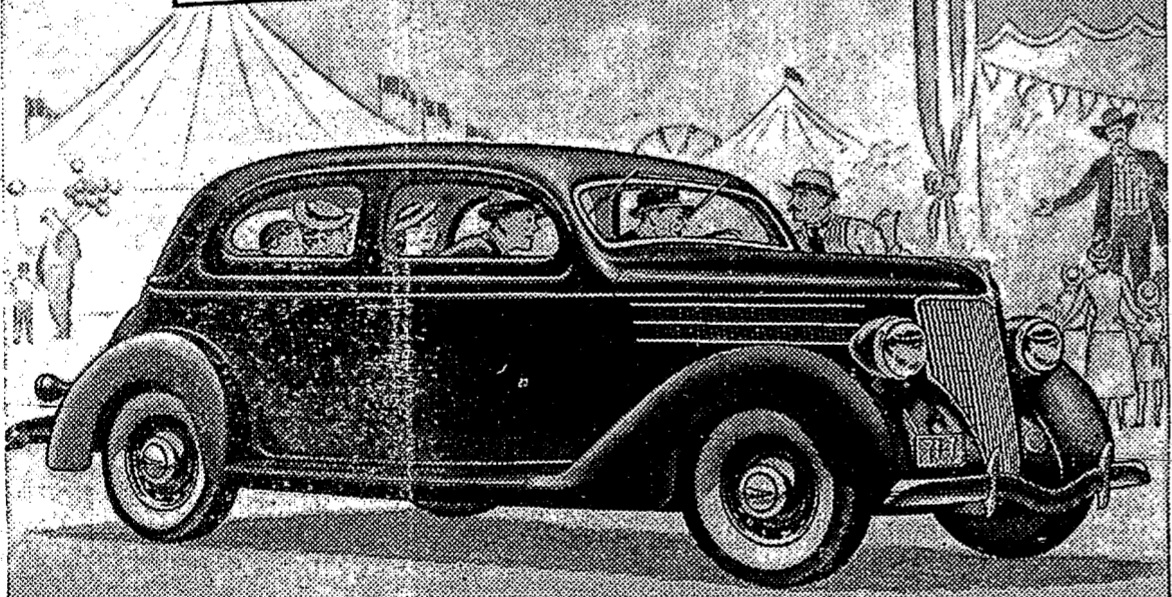
