## SPANISH WAR VETERAN LAID TO REST MONDAY

**Services at Grave in Charge of Spanish War Veterans, American Legion and U. S. Army**

Charles A. Lariou, Resident of Clarkston, Succumbed Friday

Friday morning Charles A. Lariou answered the call to his home eternal. Mr. Lariou had been in poor health for some time and had been taken to St. Joseph's hospital for an operation, when death came from uremic poisoning.

Born in Dundas, Ontario, in 1881, he came to Pontiac with his parents when he was twelve years of age. He has made his home in Clarkston since 1929.

During the Spanish-American War he served his country, honorably and well, in the 33rd Michigan Infantry, serving in both Cuba and the Philippine Islands.

He is survived by his widow, his son, Edward; a grandson, Douglas Lariou; a sister, Mrs. M. Graham, of Wyandotte; and a brother, Robert, of Pontiac.

Services were held Monday afternoon at the home with Rev. C. E. Edwards officiating. The many beautiful floral offerings and the comforting words of Rev. Edwards were expressions of the friends he had made during his lifetime.
