COMMENT AND CRITICISM

Remember George Elliott's famous novel, Adam Bede. Recall where the sweet, young girl erred and paid for her transgressions by being transported to a colony on one of England's Convict Ships. One of Great Britain's great traditions—enforcement of laws. Remember the young husband, taken from his young wife and forced into one of England's ships in the "Mutiny on the Bounty"—another of Great Britain's great traditions—Love of Country before any other love. And without even thinking, you know the rule of Monarchy—and a great tradition of Great Britain—the King can do no wrong. But today traditions rest in ash cans. Ideas that Adam followed after leaving the Garden of Eden have been replaced. Time does not march backwards. We are not creating traditions. Time does not stand still. We are not standing still with traditions. Time marches on . . . indeed Time races on, and traditions are forgotten. And for the first time in English History a King has abdicated to marry the woman of his choice.

92 years old and still thinking of others at the time of her death . . . a symbol of a useful life devoted to the betterment of the world in general. We regret that we were unable to secure the script from which a Detroit broadcaster read a beautiful eulogy of the life of Mrs. Timothy Edwards, stepmother of Rev. C. E. Edwards but quoting from the same we find that Mrs. Edwards belonged to a group of women who were knitting clothes for the poor this Christmas season. Her unfinished work, a dark red sweater, stopped by the hand of death, was taken to the meeting of the group to be finished and it was promised that not only would the work be completed but given to the poor thus assuring that her last bit of work, on earth, for her fellowmen, would serve the unselfish purpose for which it was intended.

POWER SHORT COURSE IS OFFERED BY M. S. C.

Intensive study of a type of power that is becoming increasingly popular in Michigan and other states is offered in a short course on diesel engines to open the first week in February at Michigan State College. Enrollment will be restricted to about 40, says Professor L. G. Miller of the mechanical engineering department. He recently attended a conference in Chicago with men from seven other land grant colleges and with representatives of eight diesel manufacturers. The three weeks short course will be open to those service and garage men with sufficient mechanical ability and experience to understand the course which will deal mainly with servicing diesel engines. Their use includes power for trucks, buses, tractors, railroad equipment and stationary power.

Many Schools To Receive State Aid

The First Installment Is Due After Dec. 15th

County School Commissioner E. J. Lederle has figured the amounts of money Oakland County school districts will receive during the present school year under the Thatcher-Sauer law. This relief goes to schools where the cost of operating the school exceeds the sum produced by a levy on taxpayers of two and a half mills on the equalized valuation plus the primary school money and such funds as are received from tuition. Where these are inadequate the State makes up the difference.

The first installment is due after Dec. 15th, another in March and the third at the close of the school year.

Among the districts included in the Thatcher-Sauer distribution are, Clarkston \$6,176.84; Bailey Lake \$85.18; Seymour Lake \$29.39; Davisburg \$473.49; Springfield \$160.17; Donelson \$19,086.59; Waterford Center \$1,617.03; Drayton Plains \$12,034.87; Waterford Village \$3,581.98.

HOLIDAY PHONE RATES WILL BE REDUCED

Long distance telephone rates will be reduced for the approaching Christmas and New Year's days, according to announcement by the Michigan Bell Telephone Co. Similar reductions will apply throughout the Bell system for the two holidays as stated by P. J. Becker, manager in this area for the company.

The Christmas and New Year rates will in general be the same as the Sunday reduced rates applying on routes on which the day station-to-station rate is 40c. or more.

That rate also will apply to rates to Canada, Central and South America (including Mexico), Cuba and islands of the Caribbean area, Hawaii, Java and the Philippines.

On New Year's day the low rates will also apply to calls to the British Isles and most of continental Europe.

After the supper, practice on the Christmas Cantata which will be held on the Sunday after Christmas, December 27th, took place. Thirty guests were present.

More simplicity and resultant beauty in festooning the Christmas tree is suggested by Winifred Gettemy in the home economics department at Michigan State College. The old fashioned "conglomeration" of many kinds of ornaments defeats itself in too many households in her opinion.

"Simple decorations with real greens instead of artificial ornaments are most desirable," says Miss Gettemy. "If there is a fireplace available, then make that the center of the holiday display instead of scattering the decorations over doors and windows."

"If a fireplace is not available, then use a Christmas tree or a group of windows for the center of attraction. Greens can be those of pine, spruce or ground pine barked on top of the mantle or made into festoons or wreaths. A wreath makes a good center of interest."

Miss Gettemy does not relegate this work to just one person in the family who might have the eye for beauty in decoration. She thinks it still is proper and the best stimulant to Christmas spirit to have the whole family including the children participate in the decorating.

When it comes to dressing up the tree, however, she again suggests simplicity. Four schemes are useful. One includes the use of ornaments of the same color but of different sizes. Another type of ornament would be all sizes in different colors. A third type of decoration can include tinsel strips with ball decorations, and the last suggestion is for the use of just tinsel strips and bulb lights for decoration.
