POWER SHORT COURSE IS OFFERED BY M. S. C.

Intensive study of a type of power that is becoming increasingly popular in Michigan and other states is offered in a short course on diesel engines to open the first week in February at Michigan State College. Enrollment will be restricted to about 40, says Professor L. G. Miller of the mechanical engineering department. He recently attended a conference in Chicago with men from seven other land grant colleges and with representatives of eight diesel manufacturers. The three weeks short course will be open to those service and garage men with sufficient mechanical ability and experience to understand the course which will deal mainly with servicing dieequipment and stationary power.

opinion. "Simple decorations with real greens instead of artificial ornaments are most desirable," says Miss Gettemy. "If there is a fireplace available, then make that the center of the holiday display instead of scat-Mrs. Oliver Seibert is recovering tering the decorations over doors and

windows. "If a fireplace is not available, then use a Christmas tree or a group of windows for the center of attraction. Greens can be those of pine, spruce or ground pine banked on top of the mantle or made into festoons or wreaths. A wreath makes a good center of interest."

Miss Getterny does not relegate this work to just one person in the family who might have the eye for beauty in decoration. She thinks it still is proper and the best stimulant to Christmas spirit to have the whole family including the children participate in the decorating.

When it comes to dressing up the tree, however, she agains suggests simplicity. Four schemes are useful. One includes the use of ornaments of the same color but of different sizes. Another type of ornament would be all sizes in different colors. A third type of decoration can include tinsel strips with ball decorations, and the last suggestion is for the use of just tinsel strips and bulb lights for decoration.





CHRISTMAS PLANS AT CRANBROOK

Festival of Gifts, Dec. 13, Feature of Traditional Interest

The Festival of Gifts held this year on Sunday afternoon, December 13, at four o'clock, has become traditional in Christ Church Cranbrook. Following prayers, the Christmas story and Christmas litany, the church lights are dimmed almost to extinction. While the choir sings "Silent Night" unaccompanied, the shepherds silhouetted against the beautiful frescoe in the sanctuary of the church move across the chancel, down the nave to the narthex and up the north aisle to St. Paul's Chapel. In this chapel is set up a stable. About the manger in this place, Mary, the Virgin, and Joseph gaze adoringly upon the Christ Child. The shepherds join them in adoration. Following the star, the wise men with their slaves bearing gifts of gold, in-

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cense and myrrh take the same path as did the shepherds to the stable where they present their gifts and become a part of the group about the holy family. Then the angelus is rung on the bells of the carilon. Af-ter this the choir carrying old fashioned lanterns marches singing Christmas carols along the same path followed by the shepherds are assembled. Finally the entire congregation joins in the procession. On this occasion every one is asked to bring gifts of toys, clothing, food or money. Bearing these gifts, young and old alike slowly move toward the manger where they place their gifts and gaze a few minutes upon the characters grouped about the Christ Child in the stable. The people then return to their places in the pews. All the gifts left before the manger are afterwards distributed to some seventy-five needy families. As a climax to this service the Gloria in excelsis is sung and at the end the choir files silently out. Before and after the service the bellmaster plays on the carillon Christmas hymns and
