#### NEWS OF INTEREST TO LOCAL NIMRODS

The department of conservation reminds fishermen that their general fishing licenses expire on Jan. 1, the date on which the new fishing licenses for 1937 go into effect. All dealers and conservation officers in various parts of the state will be fully supplied with the new licenses before that date.

With hunting on the wane due to the expiration of legal open seasons, fishing through the ice will be one of the outdoor pastimes that will help sportsmen bridge the long winter months. Authorities expect that well over a half-million licenses will be sold in 1937.

There are no major changes in fishing regulations for the new year, fisheries men say. Regulations limiting the number of lines that may be used legally remain in effect. Not more than two single ice lines, with one hook to each line, is permitted each fisherman and these lines must cember 23 diate control." In the case of smelt fishing: any number of hooks may be used on a line.
