At about eight-thirty when the professional started quietness prevailed in the auditorium. The singers in choir sang "O, Come All Ye Faithful" as they passed up the aisle and took their places on the platform at one end of the auditorium.

The program opened with the chorus humming "Brahms' Cradle Song." The first group of songs consisted of:

Two beautiful golden harps which stood at the rear of the platform added greatly to the setting and the audience was delighted when Grace Lauster Field and Eleanor Graff Carr, harpists from Flint, took their places for the second part of the program.

They played: March Solenne—Gounod; Music Box—Van Vliet; Richard Strauss; First Prelude—Albert Chalmers.

Mrs. E. A. Butters, Mrs. H. W. Huttenlocher, Mrs. H. Burt and Mrs. Boyns presented the next part of the program singing—Lo, how a rose e'er blooming—Michael Praetorius; The Virgin by the Manger—Cesar Franck; Cradle Song—Johannes Brahms.

Grace Lauster Field and Eleanor Graff Carr then played four harp selections that were so beautiful that they held the audience almost breathless.

Their last number "Silent Night" seemed to charm the listeners and hardly a word was spoken until after the program had been completed.

The chorus then sang, When the sun had sunk to rest—Old English Noel arranged by Henry Knight; Shepherd's Christmas Song—an Austrian Folk-song arranged from Heinrich Reiman by Clarence Dickinson.

Mrs. Butters sang the soprano solo; and the closing number was A Joyous Christmas Song—F. A. Gevaert. O, Come all ye Faithful was again sung for the recessional and an enjoyable program was brought to a close. Elizabeth Ruddell Watson was the accompanist.

The Choral Club is proud of their director, Charles Hutton and they were greatly pleased when their guests complimented them on the success of the program.

NEWS OF INTEREST TO LOCAL NIMRODS

The department of conservation reminds fishermen that their general fishing licenses expire on Jan. 1, the date on which the new fishing licenses for 1937 go into effect. All dealers and conservation officers in various parts of the state will be fully supplied with the new licenses before that date.

With hunting on the wane due to the expiration of legal open seasons, fishing through the ice will be one of the outdoor pastimes that will help sportsmen bridge the long winter months. Authorities expect that well over a half-million licenses will be sold in 1937.

There are no major changes in fishing regulations for the new year, fisheries men say. Regulations limiting the number of lines that may be used legally remain in effect. Not more than two single ice lines, with one hook to each line, is permitted each fisherman and these lines must be held in the hand or under immediate control. In the case of smelt fishing any number of hooks may be used on a line.

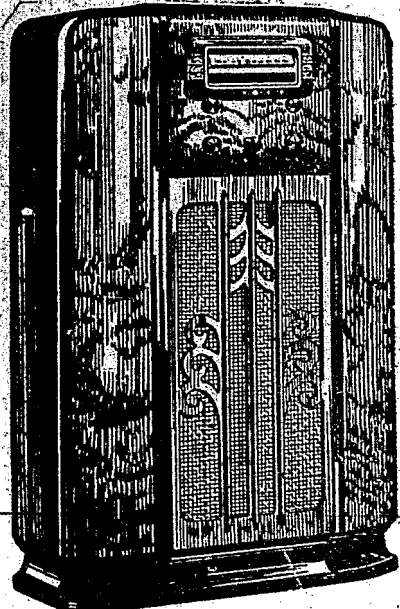

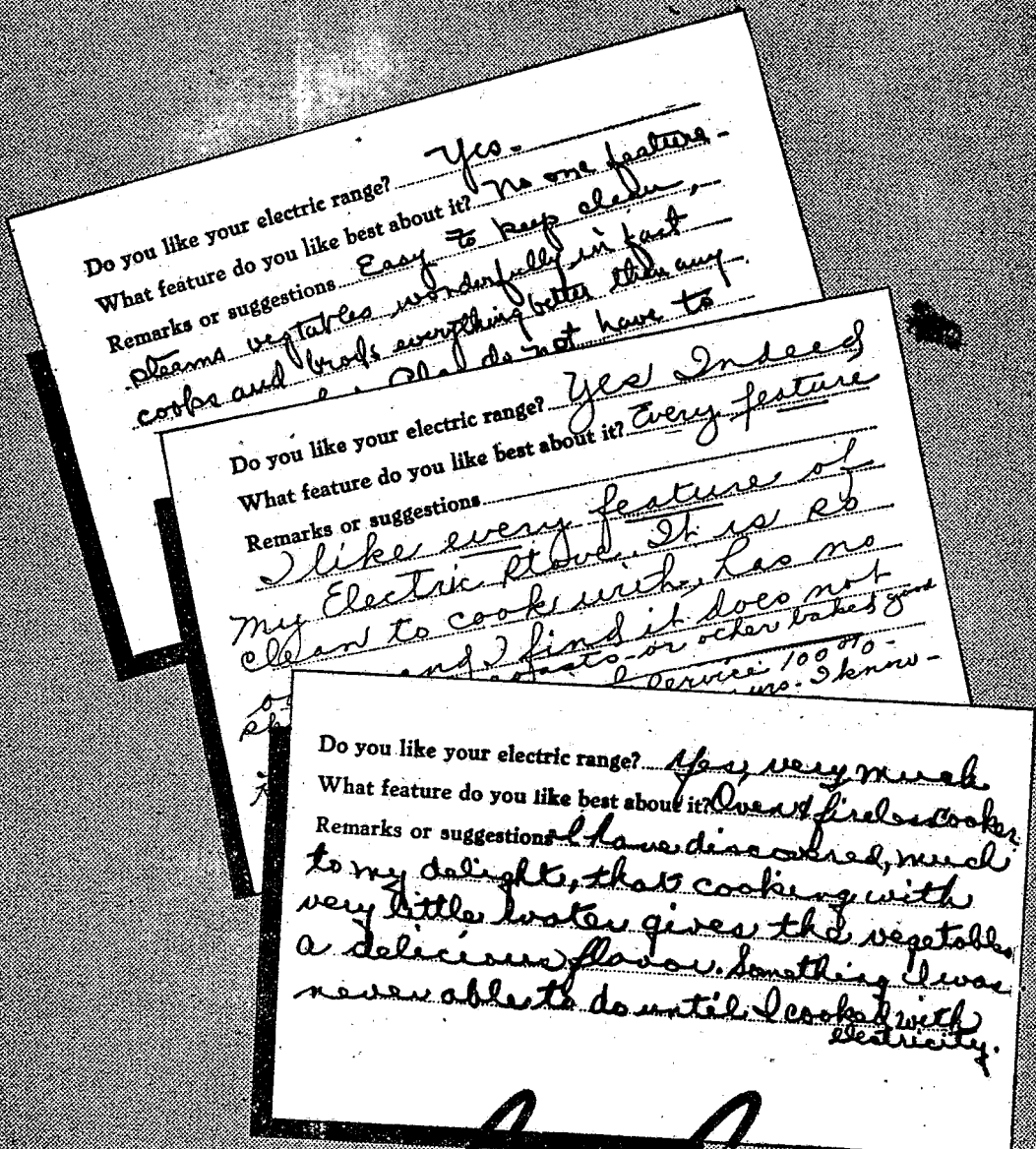
