ROCHESTER WILL HONOR A. L. CRAFT

Deserving Tribute to Well-Known Oakland Co. Educator

A mural painting, 20 feet long and about five feet wide, will soon hang in the Rochester school auditorium and the face of A. L. Craft, 81 year old former superintendent of Rochester schools, will be sketched on the work, says the Rochester Clarion. He will be depicted in cap and gown, representing education in the Roches-

ter community. Mr. Craft will be the central figure in the big historical scene, in honor of his many years of fine work in the village. He was superintendent there for 10 years, following a period of 13

years at Clarkston. Work on the mural is being done in Detroit, under the supervision of Marvin Beerbohm, of the Federal Art

Project. Rochester Board of Education on May 13, last, decided to pay honor to the educator in this fashion. A teaching career that closed in 1908, with appointment to the post of Oakland County School Commissioner, a position Mr. Craft filled for 14 years, a period that included two elected

terms, began in 1874. His first school was at Clyde and he also taught at Highland, later assuming posts at Rose, White Lake and Springfield and going on to
