#### This Is Last Week To Use Auto Stickers

Hurry, hurry, hurry! This is the plea of W. M. Shuttleworth, deputy secretary of state, to holders of half-

year auto stickers. Only three days are left for Holly sticker holders to buy their full year plates. There will be no extension of the deadline. Yet the stickers just drift in very slowly. It is doubtful

Half year license stickers become useless at midnight, July 31. This means that starting August 1 only cars with full year plates will be legally entitled to use the state's thoroughfares. Therefore, unless there is some greatly renewed activity, some motorists will be compelled to go about their business sans automobile starting August 1. State regulations forbid any extension of this deadline.

Sticker registrations and car titles should be brought along when application for the license plates is made.
