Social Security Board Has Pontiac Office

Redman is manager of this office and states that one of the principal functions is the issuing stand. of Social Security Accounts Number cards to those who have not already had one issued to them. Those applying in person will be given their cards immediately at the office and all applications made out on an SS-5 Form and mailed in, if properly and completely filled in, will be issuedpromptly and mailed to the applicants. In this connection, Mr. Redman urges that no one apply for more than one card as that number is set up on each person's account in Washington and will be good as long as the person lives.

Claims are being filed for those who reach age 65 and have worked any since January 1, 1937 when the Social Security Act became effective, and also in the case of those who die and have worked in covered employment during 1937. The family, meaning the direct heirs, is urged to call at the office at the earliest convenience in either of the above classes. Just one word of caution! Mr. Redman desires to mention that people who were over age, 65 last January 1 should not apply at the Social Security Office for any old-age insurance benefits, but rather should call on the Emergency Welfare Relief Administrators in their county of residence.

County Agr. Agent_Offers Assistance to Oakland Growers

One of the new features of the Southeastern Michigan Potato Show to be held at Lapeer November 9-10-11 is a class open to potato growers who grew 5 acres or more in 1937.

This contest is based upon the total yield of potatoes per acre, the percent they will grade U. S. Fancy, and the placing of the grower's sample in the show. Yield determinations are made by the County Agricultural Agent or his representative, or verified by two disinterested parties, either in taking actual number of bushels harvested or digging three one hundred foot rows in various places in the field and calculating the total in this manner. \$60 of the premium list is being given to the winners in this contest. One hundred pound samples of field run potatoes are placed on exhibit at the Show and the winners determined from the highest scoring contestants. The following example illustrates the method of scoring Total yield per acre 200 bushels, percent U. S. Fancy grade 80%. This makes a total score of 280 points for the contestant.

Growers who have 5 or more continuous acres of potatoes are urged to enter this contest. Assistance will be given from this office if desired states Karl D. Bailey, County Agricultural Agent.

College Tells Farmers How to Combat It
