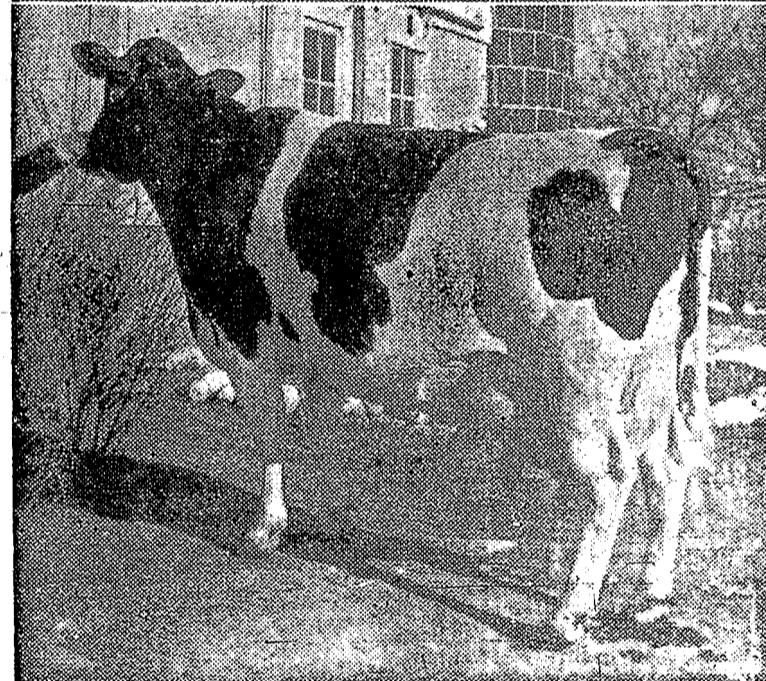
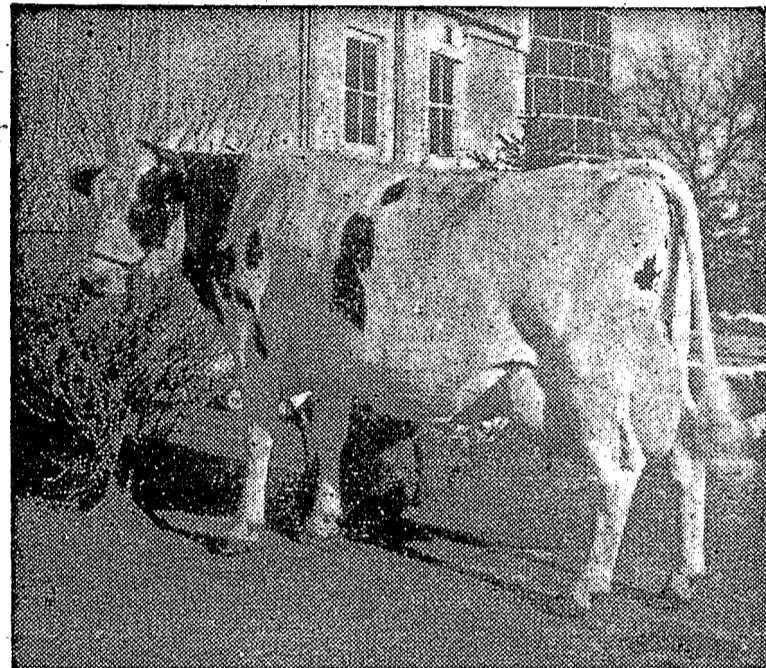
William Truba

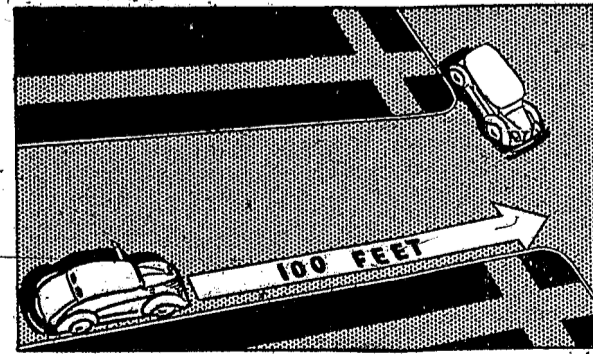

What Every Driver Must Know

STOPPING AND TURNING

You may be asked about stopping and turning when you apply for your new Michigan driver's license. If you use your stop light for a signal, press the brake pedal lightly several times. Start giving the signal at least 100 feet before turning or stopping. Be sure you are clear of traffic, then get into the right lane to turn right. To turn left, use the lane nearest and to the right of the centerline.



Here is a digest of the state law covering these subjects. The only hand signal required or permitted in Michigan is given by extending the arm straight out from the left of the car. Mechanical and electrical signals are permitted. Local officials may mark the pavement showing how to make left turns in certain spots. Follow these where they appear, otherwise observe the above regulations.

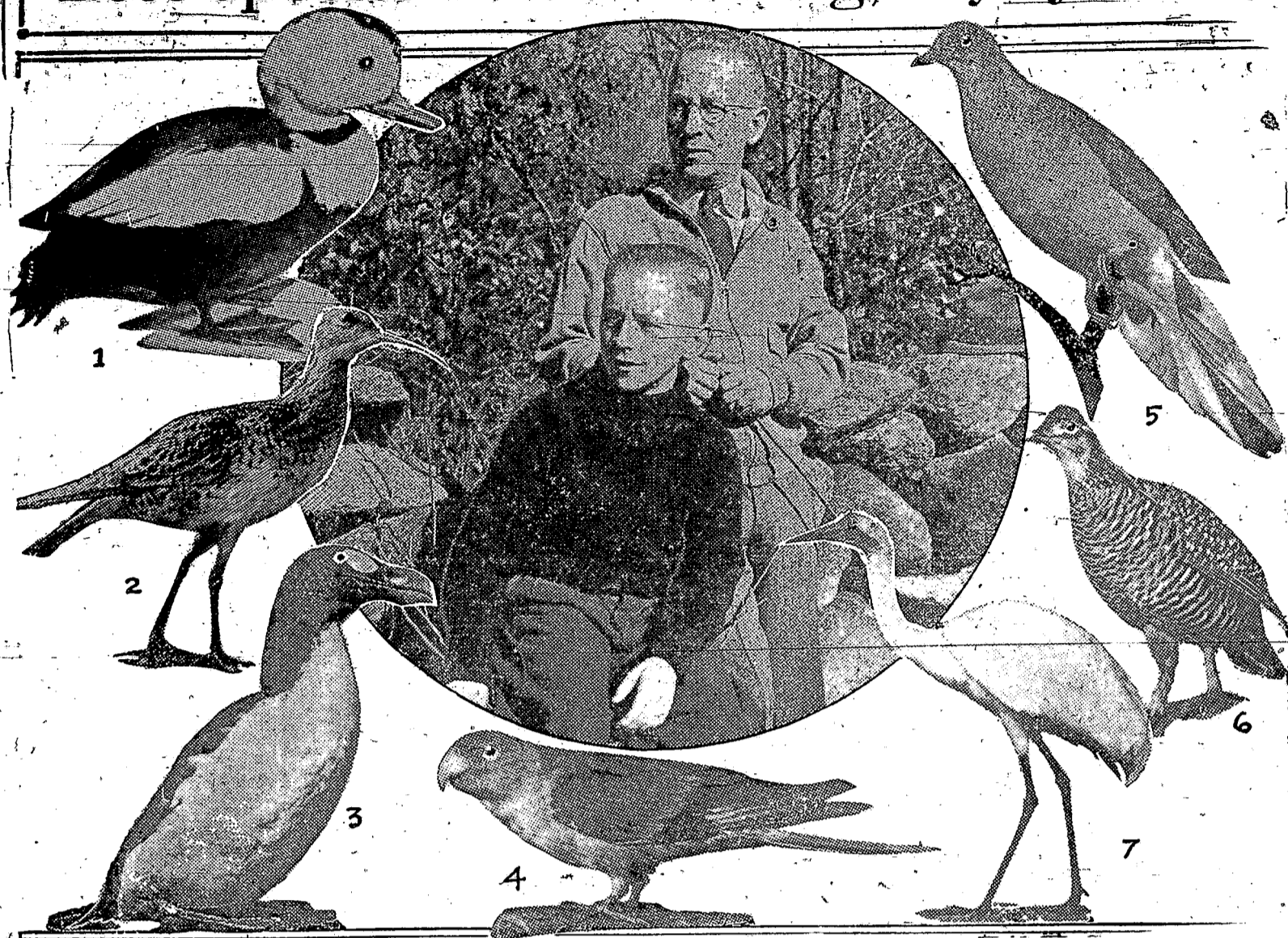

## Lost Species Point Warning, Says Jord.



Frederick F. Jordan, director of National Wildlife Restoration Week, and Sonny Jordan on the grounds of the Jordan home in Connecticut. The General Wildlife Federation, sponsoring Wildlife Week, was founded in response to the demand for a nation-wide alliance of organizations concerned with the future of outdoor America. Mr. Jordan points out that many species, once abundant in this country, are either extinct or in danger of extinction. Here are (1) the Labrador duck, last one killed in 1878; (2) Eskimo curlew, a "missing" species, may be extinct; (3) great auk, extinct for a century; (4) Carolina parakeet, last one killed in Florida, 1904; (5) passenger pigeon, last one died in Cincinnati Zoo in 1914; (6) heath hen, last one died at Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts, in 1933; (7) whooping crane, a few stragglers left.

### For Homemakers

Why do girls come to college? Leading the list of motives is the desire to prepare for some specific career, according to a questionnaire

circulated among 168 sophomore coeds at Michigan State college. The survey was conducted in freshman orientation course by members of the home economics department.

Desire for a special career was checked by 126. An interest in a particular field drew 61 more to college. Only 15 of the women admitted that intellectual curiosity and interest in intellectual fields had attracted them.

The chance for self improvement was the driving force listed by 59, according to the survey, while 54 wished to accomplish worthwhile things and 52 came to gain increased self knowledge.

The wishes or ambitions of parents were listed by 58 of the coeds as reason for continuing their education while 39 held the development of college friendships and associations as their paramount purpose in entering.

46 of the coeds expect or hope for increased income from their college courses.

### FISH AND THEIR NAMES

Lansing—When you catch a blue gill you've got a perch, but if the bite turns out to be a large-mouthed black bass, it's a white salmon.

And a wall-eyed pike is a river trout while a sunfish may be a buffalo.

Such is the variety of names for the same fish in different parts of the country.

The fish known in Michigan as the bluegill is called elsewhere a blue bream, blue sunfish, copper nosed bream, black-eared pondfish, blue-mouthed sunfish, blue perch and just plain perch or sunfish.

The large-mouthed black bass is also termed a green bass, a chub, a trout, a Welshman, a cow bass, a rock bass, a yellow bass, white bass, white salmon and white trout. Altogether this fish is known by about 40 different names.

What Michigan anglers know as a wall-eyed pike is a river trout, a glass-eye, a yellow pike, a pickerel, a blue pike, a Jack salmon or a white-eye in other sections.
