The Brown Thrasher
 (Harporhynchus rufus)
 The Brown Thrasher is rather a large bird. Its upper parts, wings and tail are bright rusty brown. The under parts are white marked with spots and streaked with black. This bird has been called the brown thrasher, brown thrush, sandy mockingbird, red thrush and brown mocker.
 The nest of the brown thrasher is usually built on the ground or in a low bush or shrub. The eggs are from four to six in number and are dull white with reddish brown spots.
 The brown thrasher devours many canker worms, cut worms and beetles and they are considered of great benefit to the farmer. The song of the brown thrasher is hard to describe. It sings with great vigor during the nesting season. The song is of long duration and is full of life and joy.
 Thoreau states the farmer when planting their seeds always thinks they hear the thrasher say "drop it", "drop it" "cover it up" "pull it up" "pull it up".

It is planned to have this or these trucks tour the country during the scholastic year, visiting the sparsely settled communities where children of rural schools have no opportunity whatever to view a stamp exhibit. Frames will be made up from the Philatelic Exhibition headquarters in Washington and a practical philatelist will accompany this truck which will have a

special guard on duty day and night throughout the entire time it is touring the country.

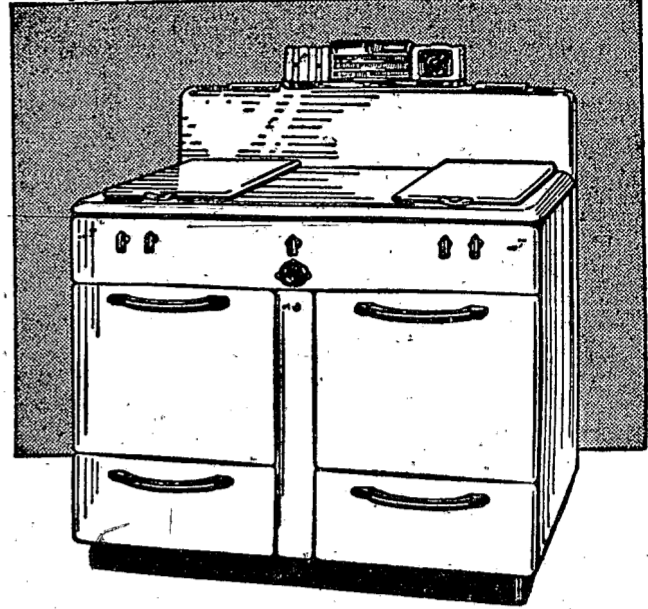
