The proposed Agreement Program would be effective until July 31, 1938, unless previously terminated by the Secretary of Agriculture, if such action is favored by a majority of growers voting in a referendum.

The elimination of cull potatoes in interstate shipments and Federal-State inspection of such shipments are the two major provisions of the proposed program. In years of normal production, elimination of cull potatoes and inspection of interstate shipment should afford ample protectoin to potato producers. When, however, excessive surpluses threaten disaster to markets and farm prices, the area committees could recommend limiting by grade and size the quantity of potatoes, other than culls, which could be shipped in interstate commerce. No restriction would be made on shipments within the state of origin, or in foreign trade, or an officially certified seed potatoes when sold for seed. Small shipments of 2,000 pounds or less would be exempt

undre the Program. It is possible for an individual producer to be exempt from the regulations if the shipping restrictions on potatoes above cull would prevent him from disposing of as large a portion of his crop as the average disposed of by other producers in his locality Administration of the Program would be in charge of a committee for each area, composed of growers and handlers, while a Late States Potato Committee would consider problems affecting all areas under the Program.

Payment of the administrative expenses is proposed through the pro rata assessment against handlers The maximum assessment would be \$1 per car, \$1 per truck load of more than 20,000 pounds, and 50 cents for truck load of less than 20,000

> The first of the science drama pictures built on this idea was a short subject, "The Romance of Radium", dealing with the discovery of the mysterious element by the French scientist Curie whose work was carried on after his death by Mme. Curie. It was filmed as a biographical story with commentary by Pete

The first full-length feature along the same line was "The Life of Louis Pasteur," with Paul Muni, dealing with the scientific discoveries of the French scientist who developed serum inoculations. "Men in White", one of Clark Gable's outstanding pictures, glorified the work of great surgeons ngainst a background of human irama, and several other pictures were inspired by it.

The mysterious and technical aspects of scientific drama no longer bacle the layman because by means of clever dialogue the ordinary conversations of the actors makes the scientific facts clear with a minimum of technical verbiage.

In "Yellow Jack", for instance, all the scientific explanations are made by Lewis Stone (playing Dr. Edward-Reed, army medical officer during, the Spanish-Américan war), to his enlisted men, hence rendering such




