Pontiac Varnish Co. **Enters Retail Field**

Retail Paint Store to Be Opened in Pontiac

The Pontiac Varnish Company today announced it will enter the retail field for the sale of its products by opening a store in Pontiac at Cass and Huron Streets, on Friday, Dec. 16, 1938.

During the last five years continuous research has been carried on in the plant to develop paints for home use and now the factory is prepared to meet the demands for its protective coatings line as quickly as the market can be enlarged.

One of the outstanding industries of Pontiac, the company was established in 1902 just when automobile manufacture was becoming an economic factor in this territory. It was natural, therefore, for the company to specialize in automotive finishes and since then it has occupied an important position in that field. The Company also manufactures a complete line of paints for home use which up to this time has been sold through dealers.

Founders of the company were C H. Hutchins, W. H. Price, and R. G. Kneale. Originally it was known as the Price Varnish Company, but in 1907 Mr. Price's interest in the business was purchased by his partners and in 1911 the company was reorganized, becoming the Pontiac Varnish Company.

growth. The original plant has been rebuilt and enlarged twelve times. Even during depression years the company suffered only a small loss of business and its production has continued to increase above the genera business average.

35 passengers. The new buses, which are streamlines in appearance, are sturdily built of steel with the bodies well insulated to defy the cold. The exterior of the buses are painted the familiar

Blue Goose blue. Comfort of passengers is, of course, the important requirement, and in these buses it is stressed to an exceptional degree. For instance, the well upholstered individual seats can be adjusted to an angle that assures the greatest comfort, and a soft, head-fitting pillow is attached

to each seat. 

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
