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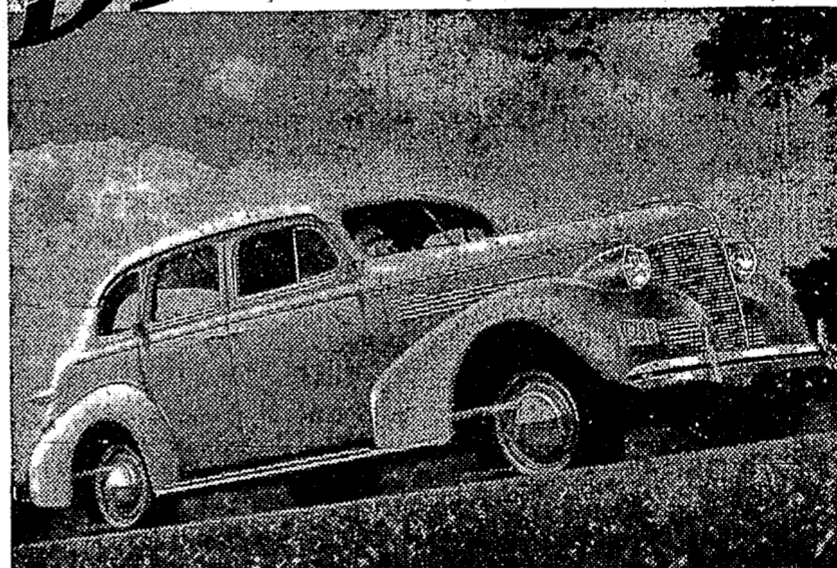

Pointers on Painting
Special Finishes for Floors and Walls

Painted floors and linoleum with worn patterns can be given an interesting finish in the following manner:
First apply a coat of floor enamel of any desired color and allow to dry thoroughly. Then take a cheap grade of sponge and trim one side to a flat surface with a sharp knife or shears. Wet the sponge and squeeze it as dry as possible. Now take a board about 12 x 18 inches and cover it with paint of any desired color. Use this as though it were a stamp pad and the sponge as though it were a rubber stamp.
Press the sponge on the painted board and make one impression on the floor with a firm, even pressure. Renew the color on the sponge and make another impression, repeating the process until the whole floor is stippled over. Repaint the board as often as it is touched all over with

the sponge. Several stipple colors can be applied by using a separate sponge and palette board for each color. When the stippling is dry, varnish. Walls can be stippled in the same way, and there is another easily applied attractive finish called "Scumbling".
To scumble a wall, first paint it with any desired wall paint or enamel. Then make up a scumble coat by adding a color in oil, such as Raw Sienna or Van Dyke brown to glazing liquid, and apply it to the wall. The scumble pattern is produced by pressing, rolling, or patting this coat while it is still wet with newspaper or rags. Loosely crumpled paper gives a coarse pattern, tightly wadded paper a fine pattern, and numerous other variations can be obtained as desired.
Tinted glazing liquid is also used for "antiquing" walls and woodwork. Paint the surface first with white enamel. When thoroughly dry, apply the glazing liquid as a sort of wash coat. Then before this dries wipe it off with a soft cloth, removing it from the surface but leaving slight amounts in corners and depressions. This gives a light ivory finish. Other finishes are obtained by varying the ground coat and the tint used in the glazing liquid.
