#### **Waterford Project** Approved

Rep. George A. Dondero has received word from the Works Progress Administration to the effect that Project O. P. 65-1-51-116, carrying an allotment of \$29,017, sponsored by the Waterford Township Board, has been designated as acceptable for inclusion in the W. P. A. program. This project provides for the construction of a water distribution system throughout Waterford township, including excavating; laying pipe; installing hydrants, valves and valve boxes; backfilling; grading; and per-forming incidental and appurtenant work. The project, according to W. P. A. routine, is now eligible for operation at the discretion of the Michigan office of the W. P. A. and its decision will be governed largely by the availability of funds, the presence of certified relief labor of the types and skills required, and other considerations.

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
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
