To assist in the care of the less fortunate school children and under privileged in their immediate locality, a new section of Needlework Guild held its first ingathering in the parlors of the Community Church of


Waterford Friday evening.

The affair on Friday was the occasion of the monthly penny supper of the Dixie Ann group of the church.

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
