#### "Telephone Night" At Clarkston School **Tonight**

Everything is in readiness for Clarkston's big telephone show which opens at the high school gymnasium at 8 o'clock tonight.

Indications point to a large attendance according to Walter B. Fauser, of Birmingham, manager for the Michigan Bell Telephone in this area. He emphasized that everyone is in-

"Telephone Night" will mark Clarkston's 45th year of telephone service, and those who attend will be given some idea of telephone progress since the first telephone was installed here in 1894. That was 16 years after the introduction of the telephone to Michigan,

As Fauser put it, "Clarkston may not have been the first town to have telephone service in Michigan, but today it has service as fine as any in

the world." Dial service telephone was initited here the latter part of May following the fire of April 4 which partially destroyed the old central office. Forty-five years ago, there was only one telephone here. Today 340 telephones are operated in the

Clarkston exchange. For "Telephone Night" tonight, the Clarkston High School band will play from 7:45 to 8 o'clack, when the evening's program will get under way with D. M. Winn, superintendent of schools, introducing Fauser. Following the introduction of other employes of the company who will attend, Fauser will demonstrate the operation of Clarkston's new dial telephone system by means of a complete, although minature, dial central office set up on the stage. During this demonstration, the audience will actually see in operation the inthe dial and seeks out the one tele-

Moving pictures will follow the demonstration of research products, one picture being a travelogue depicting scenes in some of the 70 or more countries which may now be reached by telephone. phones were silenced overnight. An exhibit which has been special feature at the New York and San Francisco fairs this year will be brought here for the occasion. It is called the "Voice Mirror", and permits a person to hear his or her own voice as it sounds over the telephone. Half a dozen extra receivers are attached to the equipment, permitting one's friends to "listen in"

A companion exhibit to the "Voice Mirror", the oscillograph, also will be

This exhibit will include a large illuminated map showing the routes calls take in countries of the world and even ships at sea. Telephone directories from the leading cities of the world will be
