PROCLAMATION

Issued by Governor on Sale of Christmas Seals

In a proclamation issued this week, Governor Luren D. Dickinson called attention to the sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals which opens December 1 and urged the people of Michigan to join in the campaign to eradicate tuberculosis through their generous purchase of the seals.

The proclamation reads: "For over 30 years the people of Michigan have waged war on a shadowy hidden foe, a killer of youth, a destroyer of hope, an interrupter of the life-flowering of a nation, the great white plague, tuberculosis."

"Ignorance has been its chief ally and it is in ignorance that the Michigan Tuberculosis Association, organized in 1907, has aimed its heaviest attack. Today the lowest death rate in the history of the state testifies to the effectiveness of the association's repeated charge."

"But with the disease in retreat it is not the time to lay down our arms. Homes are still broken, lives are still taken and the cost to state and nation is still greater than the cost of

any other war. "Therefore, in conformity with long established custom, I, Luren D. Dickinson, governor, hereby call upon the people of the Commonwealth to join with the Michigan Tuberculosis Association in its constructive and merciful work through generous purchase of tuberculosis Christmas Seals."

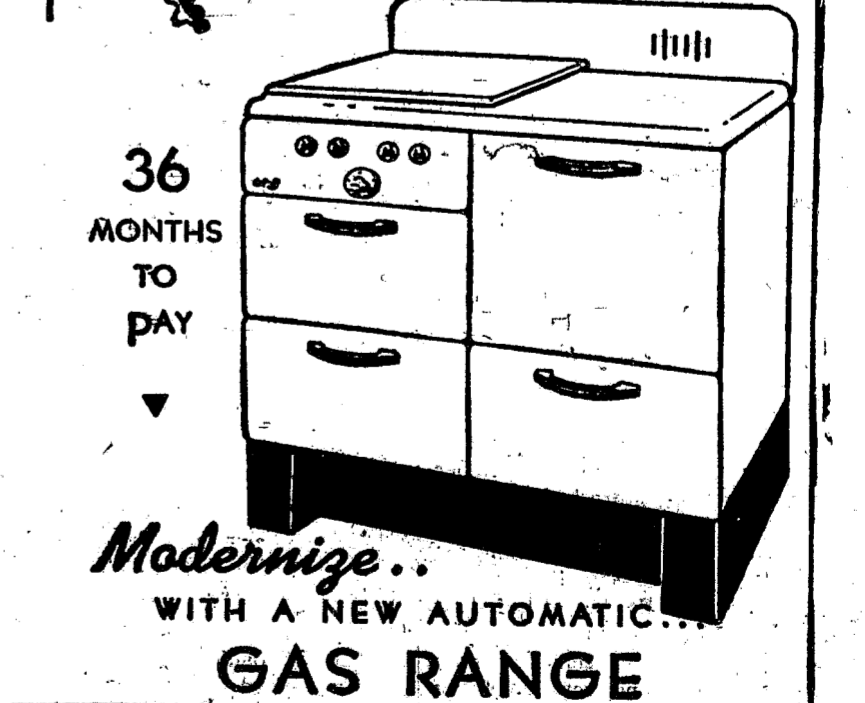

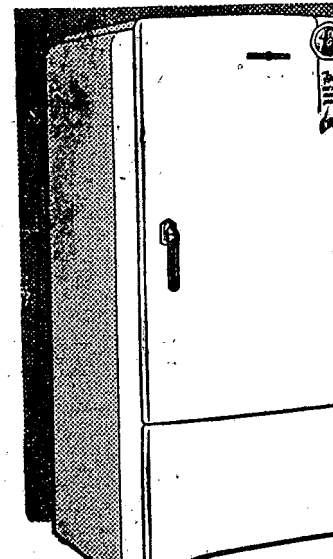

Safetygrams

Do you know how many feet you travel per second at sixty miles an hour? Many accidents are caused when the motorist fails to realize the terrific speed he is traveling at sixty miles an hour and how long it will take him to stop the car. An English judge discovered a very simple formula by which this could be figured. The answer is cor-

rect within 2 per cent. The formula is to take the speed shown on the speedometer and add one-half the speed to arrive at the number of feet traveled per second. Try it. 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PROPER FEEDING PAYS DAIRYMEN

Twenty thousand cows can't be wrong. So the figures obtained from herds in Oakland and other counties in Michigan prove conclusively that with wise selections of feeds it certainly pays to feed a good milk producer. Dollar returns above feed costs rise surprisingly within reasonable limits.

A year ago a mass of figures went in to federal tabulators in Washington who searched for results from the Michigan dairy herd improvement associations records. Some of the animals fell into each of the various dollar return groups. In the lower brackets were some 156

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WINTER MULCH ON STRAWBERRY CROP

Now Is the Time to Apply It For Best Results

Whether it's just a small home garden planting or a large commercial acreage, it's time for strawberry growers in Oakland county to put on a suitable winter mulch.

Materials suggested by Professor R. E. Loree of the horticulture department at Michigan State College include marsh hay if it can be obtained at low cost, or straw from wheat, oats or rye if they are free from weed seeds or grain.

Mulching reduces winter damage, insures cleaner and brighter berries and helps reduce loss of soil moisture.

Effectiveness of the mulch depends on the time and manner of application, says Professor Loree. Application should be soon after the soil begins to freeze in the fall, in Michigan in late November or early December.

How thick a mulch? There should be two or three inches when settled, to provide ample winter protection. Depending on the material, this takes from two to three tons of straw for an acre.

If the mulch is comparatively heavy it will be necessary to open it over the rows next spring when the plants try to grow through. Otherwise the mulch need not be disturbed until after the harvesting season. This one question is one frequently submitted to the college in meetings and correspondence.

Some delay in spring can retard blossoming and help escape damage from late spring frosts, but this must be timed well, otherwise plants will smother. Any of the periodic examinations in spring showing indications of bleaching of the plants means the mulch should be opened regardless of the calendar.
