Senior Play Tomorrow Night

Tomorrow night, James Barrie's "The Admirable Crichton" will be presented by the Senior Class of Clarkston High School in the auditorium at 8:00 P. M. We hope to have a record attendance for this fine play. Citizens & Taxpayers To Meet Tonight

Tax Problems to Be Discussed

Faced with the prospect that Oakland County's income will be anywhere from \$150,000 to \$250,000 less than the total budgeted expenditures of \$1,142,392 for 1940, the Oakland Citizens' League seeks to acquaint all citizens and taxpayers with the situation and to bring about a working agreement with the county's officials which may avert the financial debacle through which the City of Pontiac and the Pontiac School District have been passing.

The facts will be presented and discussed at a "Town Meeting" under the League's auspices in the Board of Commerce Auditorium at Pontiac Friday, December 8, at 8:15 p. m. The meeting will first hear Dr. Lent D. Upson, director of the Detroit Bureau of Governmental Research, whose topic will be "Is County Government a Hodge-Podge?"

Carl E. Huyette, executive secretary of the Oakland Citizens' League, has invited all service and civic organizations in every city and village of the county to send a delegation to the meeting.


