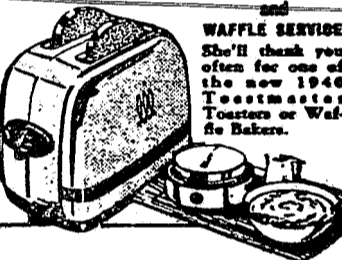

1940 REFUNDING BONDS Sealed bids for the purchase of 1940 Refunding Bonds to be issued by School District No. 3, Fractional, of the Townships of Independence and Springfield, Oakland County, Michigan, of a par value of \$115,000 will be received by the undersigned at the office of the Board of Education in the Clarkston School, Clarkston, Michigan, until 8:00 o'clock P. M., Eastern Standard Time, on the 6th day of February, A. D. 1940, at which time they will be opened and considered by the Board of Education of said school district.

The said bonds will be dated as of March 1, 1940, will be numbered in the direct numerical order of their maturities, and will mature serially as follows: \$3,000 on the 1st day of April of each year from 1941 to 1943, both inclusive, \$4,000 on the 1st day of April of each year from 1944 to 1952, both inclusive, and \$5,000 on the 1st day of April of each year from 1953 to 1966, both inclusive, without option of prior payment except that bonds in the principal sum of \$15,000 maturing on the 1st day of April in the years 1964 to 1966, both inclusive, will be subject to redemption in inverse numerical order at par plus accrued interest on any interest payment date on and after April 1, 1945, upon thirty days' published notice. Said bonds will be coupon bonds of the denomination of \$1000 each and will bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding 2 1/2% per annum to April 1, 1942, not exceeding 3 1/4% per annum thereafter to April 1, 1947, and not exceeding 4 3/4% per annum thereafter until paid, expressed in multiples of 1/4 of 1%, said interest to be payable on October 1, 1940 and semi-annually thereafter on the 1st days of April and October of each year. Both principal and interest will be payable at the Detroit Trust Company in the City of Detroit, Michigan, or at its successor paying agent named by said school district which shall be a responsible bank or trust company in the City of Detroit, Michigan.

The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid produces the lowest interest cost to the school district after deducting the premium offered, if any. Interest on premium will not be considered as deductible in determining the net interest cost. These bonds will be the general obligation of said school district which is authorized and required by law to levy upon all the taxable property therein, such ad valorem taxes as may be necessary to pay the bonds and interest thereon, without limitation as to rate or amount.

A certified check in the amount of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of School District No. 3, Fractional, of the Townships of Independence and Springfield, must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder. No interest will be allowed on good faith checks.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the legal opinion of Claude H. Stevens of Berry and Stevens, attorneys, Detroit, Michigan, approving the legality of the bonds. The cost of said legal opinion and of the printing of the bonds will be paid by the school district.
