Little Hope Is Held for Fifth Victim

In the early hours of last Saturday morning with the temperature well below the zero mark fire destroyed the Stegner home in Windiate Park in Waterford Township claiming the lives of Mr. and Mrs. Stegner and their fourteen months old son, Philip. Another three year old son, Charles, and Mrs. Dorothy Garcia and her three year old son, Earl, of Detroit, guests in the Stegner home were rescued from the burning building. Mrs. Garcia and her son were badly burned about the face, hands, back and feet. They were rushed to the Pontiac Hospital and Mrs. Garcia passed away on Saturday evening. Little hope is held for the little boy. Charles Stegner also received burns and was taken to the hospital but he was not considered in a serious condition.

The fire seemed to have originated in an overheated stove and the blazes which were fanned by a strong wind were well beyond control before aid could reach the place. The fire was noticed by a neighbor and the Pontiac Fire department was summoned. 
