But farmers are impatient. for those who will attempt the process in the spring of 1940, here are some of the doctors' orders: Alfalfa or alfalfa and grass or just

plain grass cut for silage can be too wet if it is not mature. Cut when you would for hay in full bloom.

But don't cut too much at a time, for this same cutting may become too dry before it goes into the silo. One load ahead of the silo filler is enough to cut at a time. If the loader is efficient the swath need not be raked into a windrow. Keep someone in the silo to spread and

Do not hurry the job even in filing a small silo Settling and refilling is an aid to a better product. Especially with alfalfa a preservative such as molasses is needed--using about 40 pounds to a ton of green material. In any village in which the clerk does not maintain regular daily office hours, the village council of such village may require that the clerk of th such village shall be at his office or other designated place for the purpose of receiving applications for registration, on such other days as it shall designate prior to the last day for registration, not exceeding five days in all.

REGISTRATION OF ABSENTEE BY OATH

If any person whose name is not If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election or primary election, and shall, UNDER OATH state that he or she is a resident of such precinct and has resided in the TOWNSHIP TWENTY DAYS next preceding such election or primary election, designating particularly the place of his or her residence and that he or she possesses the other gualifications of an elector under er qualifications of an elector under the constitution; and that owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself or herself or some member of his or her family, or owing to his or her absence from the TOWNSHIP on public business or his or her own business, and without intent to avoid or delay his or her registration, he or she was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registering of electors preceding such election or primary election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he or she shall then be permitted to vote at such election or primary election. If such applicant shall in said matter, wilfully make any false statement, he or she shall be deemed guilty of perjury. Any inspector of guilty of perjury. Any inspector of election shall have authority to make such registration and to swear such person to the registration affidavit.
