Notice is hereby given, that an Annual Township Election will be held in Township of Independence, County of Oakland, State of Michigan at Independence Township Hall, Clarkston, Mich., within said township on **Monday, April 1, 1940**

Relative to Opening and Closing of the Polls
Election Revision of 1931—No. 410—Chapter VIII
Section 1. On the day of any elec-

tion polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continued open until six o'clock in the afternoon and no longer: **PROVIDED**, That in townships the board of inspectors of election may, in its discretion, adjourn the polls at twelve o'clock noon, for one hour, and that the township board in townships and villages may, by resolution, provide that the polls shall be opened at six o'clock in the forenoon and may also provide that the polls shall be kept open not later than eight o'clock in the evening of the same day. Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.

Section 2. Unless otherwise specified, the hours for the opening and closing of polls and for the conducting of elections, shall be governed by eastern standard time.

THE POLLS of said election will be open at 7:00 o'clock and will remain open until 8:00 o'clock p. m. Dated this 7th day of March, A. D. 1940.

Registration Notice Township Election Monday, April 1, 1940

To the qualified electors of the Township of Independence, State of Michigan:

Notice is hereby given that in conformity with the "Michigan Election Law" I the undersigned Township Clerk, will, upon any day, except Sunday and a legal holiday, the day of any regular or special election or primary election, receive for registration the name of any legal voter in said Township not already registered who may apply to me personally for such registration. Provided, however, that I can receive no names for registration during the time intervening between the Second Saturday before any regular, special, or official primary election and the day of such election.

The last day for General Registration does not apply to persons who vote under the Absent Voters' Law. Notice is hereby given that I will be at the L. F. Walter Store, Tuesday, March 12, 1940.

In any township in which the clerk does not maintain regular daily office hours, the township board of such township may require that the clerk of such township shall be at his office or other designated place for the purpose of receiving applications for registration, on such other days as it shall designate prior to the last day for registration, not exceeding five days in all.

Notice is hereby further given that I will be at the L. F. Walter store Tuesday, March 12, 1940, from 7:30 a. m. until 6:00 p. m. and daily, 23, 1940, the last day for registration, on which day I will accept registrations from 7:30 a. m. until 10:00 p. m. For general registration by personal application for said election the name of no person but an AC-TUAL resident of the township at the time of said registration, and entitled under the constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

REGISTRATION OF ABSENTEE BY OATH

If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election or primary election, and shall, UNDER OATH state that he or she is a resident of such precinct and has resided in the TOWNSHIP TWENTY DAYS next preceding such election or primary election, designating particularly the place of his or her residence and that he or she possesses the other qualifications of an elector under the constitution; and that owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself or herself or some member of his or her family, or owing to his or her absence from the TOWNSHIP on public business or his or her own business, and without intent to avoid or delay his or her registration, he or

she was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registering of electors preceding such election or primary election, then the name of such person shall be permitted to vote at such election or primary election. If such applicant shall in said matter, wilfully make any false statement, he or she shall be deemed guilty of perjury. Any inspector of election shall have authority to make such registration and to swear such person to the registration affidavit. Dated March 4, 1940.



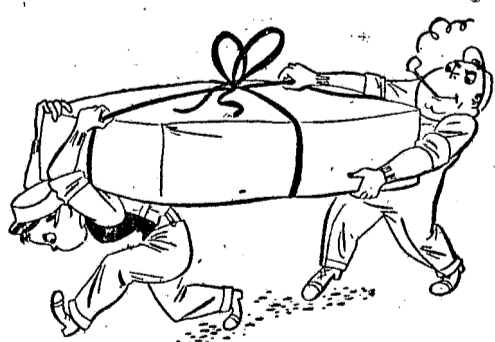
