#### Strange Accident Fatal |Clarkston May Have To Local Lad **Rotary** Club

Funeral Service for LaVerne Hoyt Will Be Held Friday Afternoon

One of the strangest and most shocking accidents occurred in Clarkston on Tuesday afternoon when La-Verne Hoyt, 16 year old son of Mrs. Emma Hoyt, met his death when he accidently stumbled and fell on his way home from school. He was immediately taken to the office of Dr. H. B. Yoh, who said death had been instantaneous. Examination revealed the Youth's neck had been broken. The only explanation appeared to be that the manner in which the lad had fallen had snapped the neck so sharply that the fracture resulted,
