Real Estate Man Dies of Injuries

Charles Miller of 8704 Highland Rd., Drayton Plains, died at the General Hospital last Sunday evening at 7:30.
Mr. Miller had only entered the hospital a short time before to have an x-ray taken of a fractured leg caused when William Blanchard of 2466 Tackless Dr., Waterford, formerly of Drayton Plains, backed into Miller as he stood beside a parked car.
Miller's leg was pinned between the cars and was fractured. He was taken to the General Hospital, Pontiac and after treatment was released.
Returning to the hospital last Sunday afternoon for a checkup on the leg, he died of pulmonary embolism.
A post mortem was held to see whether the death should be attributed to the accident and thus classified as a traffic fatality or if, to natural causes.
Mr. Miller was a World War aviator and was a native of Springfield, Ohio, and came to Oakland County three years ago.
He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Victoria Miller, and two brothers, Jack and Richard Miller of Cincinnati, Ohio.
The funeral was held last Wednesday at 2 o'clock with burial in the Ottawa Park cemetery.
