Samuel T. Beardslee **Killed** Instantly

Funeral Was Held Monday with **Burial in Sashabaw Cemetery**

Friends and neighbors of Samuel T. Beardslee were shocked to hear of his death late last Friday afternoon when he was run down by a team of norses.

Mr. Beardslee and his son, Grant, were plowing in the same field, with the son and his team some distance behind the father. Grant stopped to roll a stone from ahead of his plow when his team bolted and ran up the furrow, ran down Mr. Beardslee and into the second team. All four horses continued across the field dragging tht older man for some distance. The son ran for a car and took his

father to the house but he was dead when taken from the car.

Mr. Beardslee was very active for . his age and had always tried to do his portion of his work about the farm. He was born in 1856, on the farm adjacent to the present Beardslee farm at 6650 Pine Knob off Sashabay Road. He was married to Emma V. Wager in 1881 and she died in Dennis Collision Service, Body and 1910. In 1916 he remarried to Estie Ford, who survives him.
