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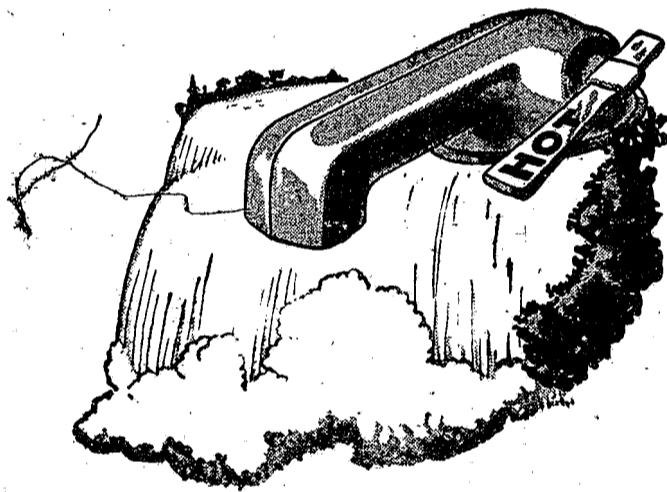

ORDER FOR EXTENSION OF TRUST AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, a certain Trust Agreement was made and entered into on the 24th day of June, 1933, by and between the Clarkston State Bank, a Michigan banking corporation of Clarkston, Michigan, and D. R. Teggerdine, Roy A. Alger, and Ray C. Ainsley, as Trustees, duly appointed by the Commissioner of the Banking Department of the State of Michigan, with the approval of the Governor, to act as such Trustees and carry out the terms, conditions and purposes of the Trust thereby created, and

WHEREAS, Section XVI and Section XX of the Trust Agreement entered into by and between the Bank and the Trustees provided that the life of the said Trust Instrument should be, in the first instance, for five years from the date thereof, but may be extended from year to year upon order of the Commissioner, and WHEREAS, The Trust Agreement was extended for one year, or from June 24, 1939, to June 24, 1940, by an order of the Commissioner of the Banking Department dated April 12, 1939, and

WHEREAS, the life of the said Trust Instrument would otherwise expire on the 24th day of June, 1940 and

WHEREAS, it appears after due examination and consideration of the affairs of this trust that its termination as of that date would result in a monetary loss to the parties in interest, the creditors of this trust, and would otherwise be inadvisable and undesirable for all parties concerned; NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing, and in accordance with authority granted by Section XVI of the Trust Agreement, I hereby extend the life of this Trust Agreement for six months, effective as of the 24th day of June, 1940, with the said Trust Agreement to expire on the 24th day of December, 1940.
