## J. R. Peters Completes

### 25th Year of Service

Friends and associates today were congratulating Jesse R. Peters, district plant engineer for the Michigan Bell Telephone Company in its Pontiac district, on his 25th service anniversary with the Bell System.

The Michigan Bell's plant engineer in this district has jurisdiction over the engineering and design of telephone plants in a territory with 17 central offices and approximately 30,500 telephones. In addition to the Pontiac office, others in this district are at Armada, Big Beaver, Birmingham, Clarkston, Lake Orion, Leonard, Mt. Clemens, New Baltimore, New Haven, Oxford, Commerce, Drayton Plains, Rochester, Romeo, Utica and Washington.

He first started work with the Bell System in 1911 as a repairman for the old Central Union Telephone Company at Dayton, Ohio. He was still with that company in 1917 when he resigned to enter the World War.

After serving overseas, Peters returned to work first with the Ohio Bell Telephone Company and later with the Michigan Public Utilities Commission on appraisals.

Nineteen years ago this month, he started with the Michigan Bell at Detroit and was assigned appraisal duties. Peters was transferred to Saginaw two years later where he remained in various capacities until 1927 when he was made district plant engineer here. Peters supervised the conversion of Pontiac's telephone system in 1929 to dial operation.

## TESTING OF WATER

### LESSENS TYPHOID

#### State Service Shows Wonderful Results in Michigan

Michigan's drinking water is becoming safer each year with less and less typhoid and other water-borne diseases—a program in which water tests conducted by the bacteriology department of Michigan State College are playing an important part.

Before 1900, water was water if it quenched the thirst, comments Dr. W. L. Mallman, in charge of the present system of testing water samples. Typhoid was common and the Michigan death rate annually from that source was 37 per 100,000 persons.

By 1928 the typhoid rate in the state had dropped to less than two persons to 100,000 and today practically every public water supply has been tested and rated safe or unfit. Some typhoid still is spread by private or semi-private water supplies.

Offer to test without charge is repeated by Dr. Mallman as part of Michigan State College statewide service. Both urban and rural dwellers continue to utilize this free service as new wells are drilled or springs are tapped. In the 12 months ending June 30, 1940, samples tested numbered 1,068. Of these 292 were for rural-urban, supplies outstate, 390 were of the Michigan State College campus system of wells and 396 were for swimming pools.

Since the new year began July 1, water supply tests have numbered 201, plus another 52 samples of swimming pool water.

Directions for sampling and sending in such samples for testing in the college laboratory are included in a newly revised Michigan Extension Bulletin, 173, "Safe Drinking Water." Copies can be obtained by writing the Bulletin Room, Michigan State College, East Lansing.

## Many Car Owners

### Need Full Year Tags

More than 425,000 motor car owners throughout Michigan are operating with first half year license tags which expire at midnight, August 31, according to announcement today by Harry F. Kelly, Secretary of State.

Although full year tags have been on sale at half price since July 10, Secretary Kelly reports that sales have been slow and that indications are that all offices will be crowded during the last week of the sale.

Many persons have inquired as to the possibility of an extension of the August 31 deadline and have been informed that under the law neither the secretary of state nor any other official has the right to grant more time.

"The law is clear on this point," said Mr. Kelly, "and it requires that violation tickets be given to car owners found operating without full year plates on September first."

To aid last minute customers offices of the secretary of state will remain open after regular hours during the last three or four days of the sale.

She has taken advantage of every opportunity in her role of a city-bred girl married to a French-Canadian guide and hunter, who finds life a dull and miserable affair in a tiny North woods hamlet, where the women of the community look at her askance, and privately agree that Akim Tamiroff—as her husband—has shown distinctly poor judgment in his selection of a mate.

When Tamiroff brings a young city doctor—Ray Milland—into his home, following a bear hunt during which the latter has sustained a broken foot, and leaves these two young people to their own devices, the critical attitude of the neighbors reaches a fever heat. Absent on an extended hunt with William Frawley—who has brought Milland to the North woods to recuperate from a nervous breakdown—Tamiroff, in his bluff innocence, has no suspicion that his wife might become irresistibly attracted to this personable young stranger within his gates.

The death of the local medico—J. Farrell MacDonald—inspires Milland with the idea to remain in the village, abandoning his lucrative city practice. He sedulously tries to hide the fact (even from himself) that a growing love for Patricia has been responsible for this decision, but both of them finally realize that the one decent thing to do is for Milland to return to the city, rather than break Tamiroff's heart.

How these two—swayed by emotions beyond their control but sincerely determined to go their separate ways, even in the face of their love for each other—find the solution to their seemingly hopeless problem, makes for a series of exciting scenes which build to a tensely dramatic climax.

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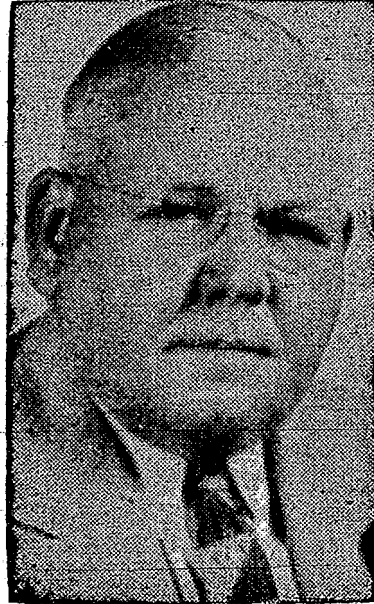

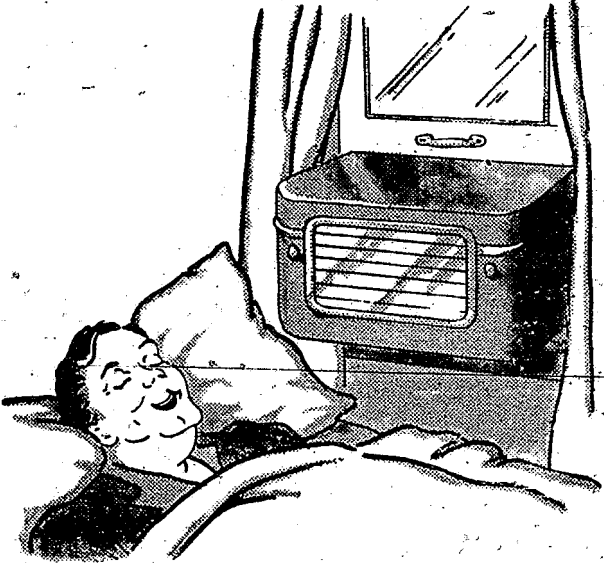
