Red Cross Water Safety Program Closes and Certificates Are Awarded

A total of 754 tests were passed during the snimmer water safety program of the Oakland County Chapter American Red Cross, according to Kline B. Hartman, Life Saving and Water Safety Chairman. Mr. Hartman states that 14 Senior Life Saving tests, 45 Junior Life Saving tests, 307 Beginners, 213 Swimmers, 163 Intermediates, and 13 Advanced tests were passed during the season. Four thousand. nine hundred and twentyfive people participated in the program. RED CROSS NOTES

American Red Cross war relief supplies are being sent to England as cargo on British vessels leaving New York. Every available foot of space is being turned over for shipment of ambulances, food stuffs, medicine, clothing and hospital supplies. To enable Red Cross to spend every dollar on supplies, British ships carry such supplies without charge. By the end of July there had been shipped to England 262,000 articles of clothing, knitted and sewed; 803,000 surgical dressings, and 17,000 hospital garments. Also by August 1 from Geneva into southern France American Red Cross had sent 95 tons of condensed milk, dired milk and various baby foods as the needs of the children are desperate. Additional food supplies, medicines and clothing were being sent to the same area. Lack of gas and greatly limited railroad facilities handicap rapid distrbution to points of greatest need. This distribution is under the direct supervision

of Red Cross representatives in France.

American Red Cross has announced plans for the mobilization of volunteer blood donors in the New York area to take part in an emergency project designed to furnish thousands of liters of blood plasma solution to the British Red Cross for treatment of war victims. Through a new method-of preparation this solution can be safely shipped and stored. and will ings. be sent by Clipper plane if emergency

Potato Growers Are Advised to Spray

Where potato growers are not equipped to spray with high pressure spraying equipment, suitable control against Late Blight which seriously menaces Oakland County potatoes can be obtained by dusting. Small hand dusters holding 10 to 15 lbs. of dust and selling for between \$10 and \$15, or wheel barrow type dusters holding 25 to 30 lbs. and costing around \$25 can be used to advantage in the control of this disease, These types of

machines are available from local farm implement dealers.

Type of dust to use: Homemade copper lime dust, made by mixing monohydrated copper sulphate and hydrated lime. The dust should be mixed in a barrel or wooden churn just previous to use. 20 lbs. of monohydrated copper sulphate are mixed with 80 lbs. of hydrated lime. This material should be applied at the rate of about 30 lbs. per acre.

The dust should be forced out of the dusting machine in a dense cloud, so that both the lower and upper surfaces of the leaves will be thoroughly covered.

The total cost per acre for the dusting material is about \$2,50 per acre.

Potato growers are urged to spray or dust before blight hits their fields.






