Literary Club Sponsors "Colonial Tea" Monday

On Monday afternoon the Clarkston Literary Club held their regular meeting and sponsored a "Colonial Tea" in the parlors of the Methodist Church. This lovely affair was open to the public and was well attended.

The meeting was opened by the president, Mrs. Lee Clark and roll call was answered by 19 members giving the name of a Colonial man or woman.

The program was as follows: two lovely vocal solos "By the Bend of the River" and "Love has but an Hour" by Mrs. Orlo Willoughby accompanied by Mrs. W. Harold Pailthorp. Mrs. Betty Jane Roberts was then introduced as the guest speaker. She was charming in a Colonial costume. She gave a very interesting talk on "The Restoration of Williamsburg". In connection with her talk she sang three short numbers, typical of Colonial music. The restoration of Williamsburg covers the period from 1699 to 1780. It was the first capital of the colonies. The settlers there arrived on May 13, 1607, with a charter covering from the northern boundary of North Carolina to Canada and from 75 to 100 miles from the seashore. The first worship was near James river with the sail from their boat as an altar. It was held on the 3rd Sunday after Trinity and in the restored Williamsburg meeting-house the Bible is open continuously at the Scripture read at that service, Romans 8-18. Williamsburg was the center of religious, political and social affairs and where the House of Burgesses met to enact laws governing the colonies. The idea of the restoration was conceived in 1927 by the Phi Beta Kappa of New York to build a Memorial Hall. Rev. W. A. R. Goodwin, pastor of the Williamsburg Episcopal Church, the oldest church in the United States in point of constant use, was the speaker at this fraternity meeting. He spoke on the history of Williamsburg. John D. Rockefeller was present and while it took him two years to formulate an active plan with the cooperation of the business people in Williamsburg, the dream of Rev. Goodwin became a reality. Twenty thousand dollars was expended in this project. George Washington was married in Williamsburg.

Mrs. Roberts made the story very realistic and interesting. She also recommended any who could to see the movie "Howards of Virginia" as it is centered around Carters Hill and historic Williamsburg.

Richard Shaughnessy then favored the group with a cornet solo, "Cavalier Polka" with Betty Ash at the piano. Miss Ash then entertained with a piano solo, "Hungarian March".

At the conclusion of the program the guests were invited to have refreshments from a table prettily arranged in Colonial style with old-fashioned glass and silver cake plates and baskets. The refreshments, too, were old-fashioned, consisting of fruit cake, ginger snaps, mints and tea. Mrs. Lucy King and Mrs. Alice Urch, in Colonial costumes, poured.

The next meeting will be held on November 12th at the home of Mrs. Lucy King and Mrs. Jessie McIntyre.

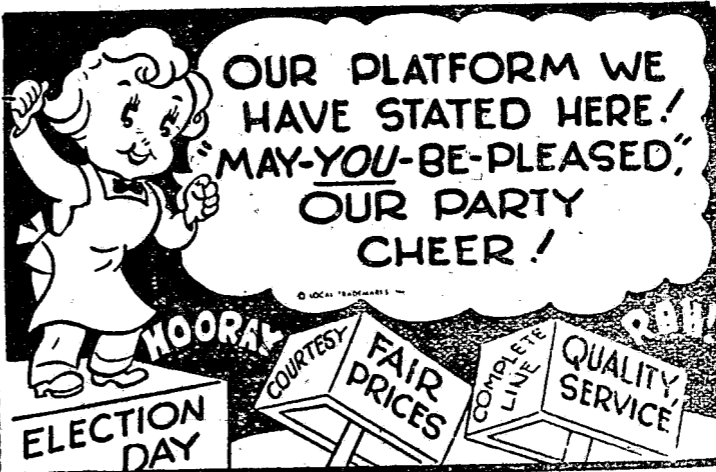
