New Street to Run By Ford Property

This last week, property on the rear of business places on the West side of Main Street, was deeded to the Ford Motor Company. The understanding is that the company will pave a street to connect West Washington Street and Depot Road and the Street will then become a public street in Clarkston. This new street will run alongside of the Ford Property and the plant to be built in Clarkston.

The creek running across M 15 and draining into Cemetery Lake has been cleared and is being made into a runway for the race from the dam. The plant will operate on this water power from the dam.

This factory will be one of 19 the company now has or will have in operation as soon as they are completed. All are located within a 50 mile radius of the Ford Motor Company, main plant. The motive behind this policy is to decentralize the industry in such a manner as to use labor in the small towns and also allow the use of farm help in off seasons on the farm.

The 16 other plants now operating in rural localities are as follows:

Brooklyn, electric starter switches; Dundee, welding points; Flat Rock, lamps; Hayden Mills at Tecumseh, soybean storage and cleaning; Milan, ignition coils; Milan Old Mill, soybean oil and meal; Milford, carburetors; Nankin Mills, engraving, fine tools and dies; Newburg, drills; Northville, valves; Phoenix, cutouts and regulators; Plymouth, taps; Saline, soybean oil and meal; Sharon Mills, lighters and stoplight switches; Waterford, precision production gauges, and Ypsilanti, generators and starters.

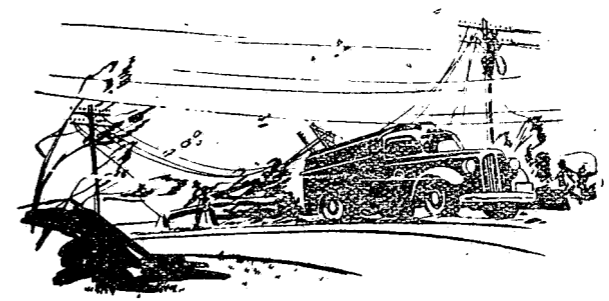

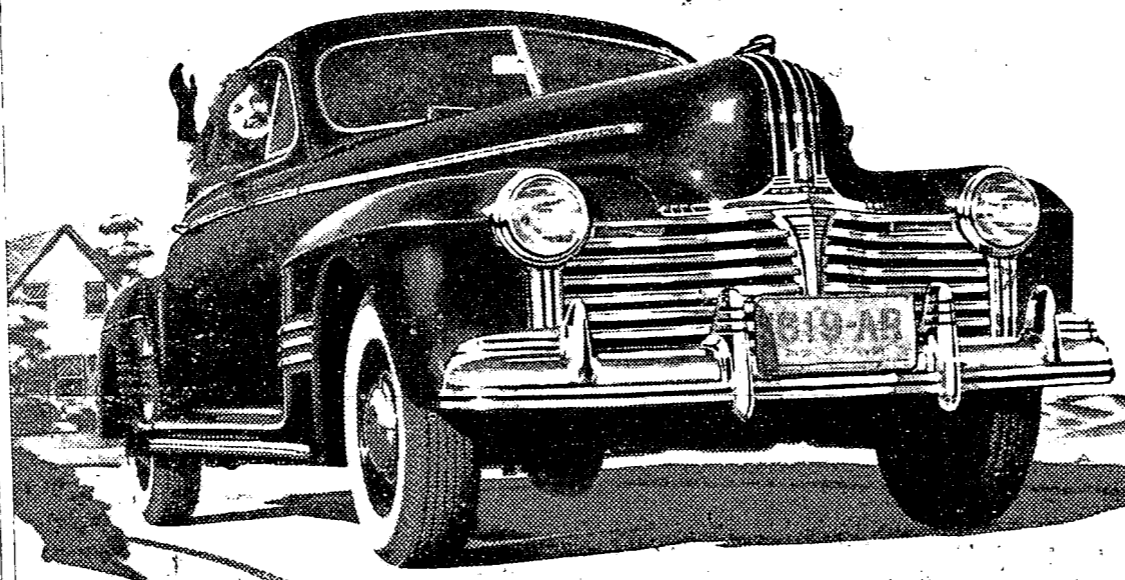

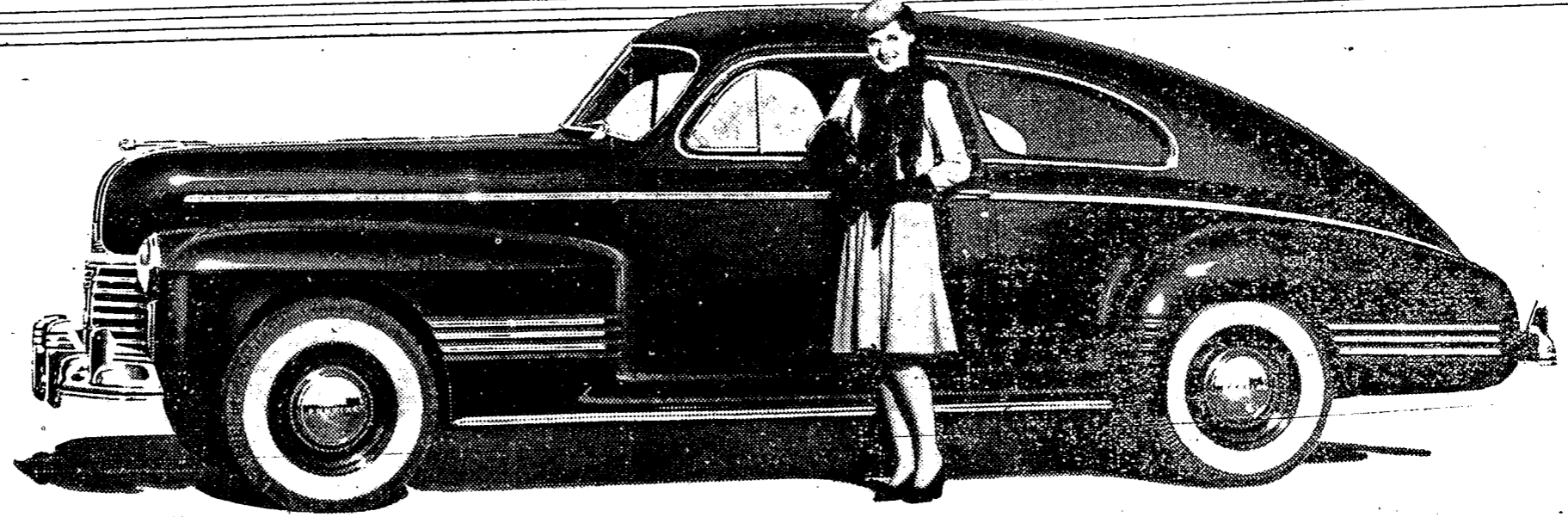
