Shop and Mail Early For Christmas!!!

Your Post Office wants you to have as complete information as possible about Christmas mailing, so that you may be sure the gifts and greetings which you send will reach their destination on time—and in proper condition.

All mail directed to the west coast should be posted not later than Dec. 12, and for each parcel-post zone closer to Detroit, a day later. Note, too, that mail for local and rural delivery should be in the Post Office not later than December 19.

Prepay postage fully on all mail matter! The rates are as follows: First Class: Letters and written and sealed matter, 3 cents each ounce. Local letters, 2 cents each ounce. Christmas cards sent in unsealed envelopes and bearing no unauthorized writing may be mailed for 1 1/2 cents. However, only first class mail is returned or forwarded in the event of nondelivery to address indicated.

Parcel Post: Address all matter plainly and completely in ink, giving street address or box or rural route number. Place senders return card in upper corner of address side. Tags should not be used unless necessary, in which case a copy of the address and return should be placed inside the parcel for identification if tag is lost.

When you use gift boxes, be sure they are securely packed in heavy corrugated outer containers; if contents are fragile the inner box should be surrounded with shredded paper, excelsior or layers of corrugated board. All packages should be securely packed and must bear complete legible address of both sender and addressee. Address must appear only on one side of package. Gift parcels should be insured, and Christmas seals or stickers should not be placed on the address side of mail.

Rural patrons will kindly have letters and cards properly stamped before leaving in mail box for rural carrier to pick up.
