#### **Credit Association Elects Officers**

Growth of the Pontiac Production Credit Association, serving Macomb Oakland and Livingston Counties, was told an audience of farmer-members and farm leaders in this territory by Fred J. Beckman, secretary-treasurer at the annual meeting of the stock-holders held at the Masonic Temple in Pontiac on December 12, 1940.

Mr. Beckman pointed out that the association loaned \$375.000 to farmers in this area in 1940, compared with \$350,000 last year for livestock and general purpose farming and he disclosed that reserves built up from earnings in the 6 years of operations totaled \$21,400. Repayments during the last year were more than \$180,-000. Losses through bad debts and otherwise were shown to be considerably less than one tenth of one per cent of the volume loaned.

#### THE STAR IS BLACKED OUT

CHRIST'S STAR! The star of the east! The Christmas star lighted on a thousand trees. War has blacked out that star. The wise men of nearly all nations today believe in war, and prepare for it. They follow not the star of the prince of peace. They feel it necessary to follow the star of Mars, the god of war.

Wait. We know, of course, that a blackout only covers a light, it does not put it out. The star that the wise men of the long years ago followed to the manger, that star still shines. It shines on a civilization that does not see it or follow it, because war has blacked out its light. There will not be even a temporary truce between England and Germany on Christmas Day. Somehow they could not arrange it. You realize it is not so very practical to think about peace on earth and goodwill toward men, the Christmas message in the time of war. It would be too demoralizing, especially we suppose, on the soldiers. War must be waged. The angel chorus of "Peace on earth, goodwill toward men" cannot break through the thud and thunder of bombs, the roar and rattle of cannon and machine guns.

All of the message and meaning of Christianity is blacked out by the shadow of war and war preparation. Not the star in the east sheds that flaring light. Those are the lurid flames of burning homes and hospitals, churches and schools, business places and factories. The light of Christ's star is the quiet, still light of peace. The nations are not yet wise enough to follow THE STAR OF PEACE, and kneel before the babe. That is WHY men live like rats in holes in Europe; WHY women and children starve this winter; WHY. pestilence and disease stalk the earth. This generation like many another was spoken about by Jesus with the words, "And this is the judgment, that the light is come into the world, and men loved the darkness rather than the light; for their works were evil."

No nation can for long black out the light of God. Man made clouds of war come between us and the light of His star. This passing war cloud will dissipate. The star of Christ will lead new, wiser generations of men to the babe Jesus and the reign of goodwill and peace will come. Now the star is blacked out for sensitive hearts. But in our hearts deep down, we know that the star of Christmas will always shine on, till all men meet before the babe in peace.

Christmas breakfast will consist of tea or coffee and one slice of bread and jam. Dinner will be weighed carefully to ensure that there is no over-indulgence, and at night they will sup off vegetables and tea or hot milk. They usually retire at nine, so as to be ready for prayer at two in the morning on Boxing day. The Guest Master says: "This way of spending the Holy Season is the best of all."


