### Stephen A. Bone, Sr.

Stephen A. Bone, Sr., aged 84 years, passed away on Wednesday of last week at his home at Seymour Lake.

Mr. Bone was born April 5, 1856, in West Bloomfield Township, the son of Thomas and Jane Bone. He spent his lifetime in Oakland County.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. John Mitchell and Mrs. John McClymont of Pontiac; one son, Stephen Jr.; two brothers, Andrew of Fenton and Charles of Walled Lake and two sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Rockwell of Clarkston and Mrs. Jennie Holmes of Walled Lake.

The funeral service was held at the Seymour Lake Church on Sunday afternoon with Rev. W. Harold Pailthorpe officiating. Burial was in Seymour Lake cemetery.

### William J. Garrison

William J. Garrison, 58 years old, of Davidsburg, died at his home in that village Saturday morning, Dec. 21. He had been in poor health for some time, and had been away for treatment, but, as postmaster, felt that he should be at the office during the holiday rush, and the extra effort thus made brought on a recurrence of heart trouble.

He was a son of A. H. and Martha (Foote) Garrison and was born at Andersonville, Oct. 5, 1881. His whole life was spent in that community, all but the first few years at Davidsburg. For a great many years he was engaged in the mercantile business as a trusted employee of Edmund Ely & Son and their successors, Frank G. Ely and the late Charles McBratney. It is probable that no other person in the vicinity has so wide an acquaintance nor was held in higher esteem.

For the past 27 years Mr. Garrison has been postmaster at Davidsburg. About two years ago he retired from the store and gave his whole attention to his own business as postmaster, insurance agent and agent for the Grand Trunk Railway.

Mr. Garrison was a member and officer of the Davidsburg Methodist church, and of Austin Lodge, No. 48, F. & A. M., of which he had been Worshipful Master.

He was married in 1904 to Miss Bessie Steele, of Davidsburg. The widow survives, together with one son, Chester Garrison, of Davidsburg, two grandsons, and two brothers, John, of Pontiac, and Lee, of Royal Oak.

The funeral was held from the late home on Monday at 2 p. m. Rev. Ralph W. Brown officiated and burial was in the Davidsburg cemetery.

## Roll Call Chairman Makes Announcement

Byron Webb, Roll Call Chairman of the Oakland County Chapter American Red Cross announces that to date the chapter has secured the total of 11923 members and a sum of \$17,463.26. Several townships have not yet reported so that a final report is not available. The Independence Roll Call under the direction of Mrs. William Dunston has to date secured 119 members and \$165.70. The Springfield Roll Call under the direction of Mrs. Glenn Ellis has to date secured 47 members and \$47.00. The Waterford Roll Call under the direction of Mr. Marshall Smith has to date secured 213 members and \$274.27. Mr. Webb thanks the large number of roll call workers throughout the county who have contributed their time and energy to this year's membership canvass. It is through their untiring efforts that the local chapter will be able to take on added duties which National defense will demand of all chapters. The American National Red Cross is making every preparation for dealing competently with welfare problems of men of the new defense army and their families, expanding all chapter services dealing with the country's preparedness.

In addition, disaster relief and community services which normally are chapter services must be continued and increased wherever possible. The local chapter has maintained First Aid and Home Hygiene services and a disaster committee as regular community activities. These will when occasion demands be increased if possible in accordance with the program of the American National Red Cross.

## NEW MAPS READY AT HIGHWAY OFFICE

Distribution of 100,000 copies of the newly revised winter highway map, which emphasizes Michigan's importance as a winter sports state, was started this week by the state highway department.

The front cover carried for the first time the reproduction of a natural color photograph of a typical winter highway scene. On the reverse side are pictures of winter sports and snow removal operations.

Hints for safe driving during winter are also listed on the reverse side, along with a list of Michigan state parks, their location, convenience, equipment and privileges. Snow-plowing and ice-treatment operations are emphasized to assure visitors of safe and pleasant transportation facilities in coming to Michigan.

The map side contains the latest corrections on the trunkline highway system, together with a mileage table, individual maps of the larger Michigan cities, the state ferry schedule, and a list of state game areas, national and state forests. In addition to these features, the map retains the accordion fold of past editions.

Copies of the map may be obtained free of charge by writing G. Donald Kennedy, state highway commissioner.


