National Commander Milo J. Warnear has proclaimed Saturday, February 22, the 209th anniversary of the birth of George Washington, as national defense registration day for all Legionnaires and unaffiliated World War veterans who care to do

On that day every American Legion post in the country will ask its membership and local World War veterans generally to fill out a questionnaire. It will chronicle every Legionnaire's capabilities and talents which could be used in national defense. These indices will enable The American Legion quickly to locate any member or veteran for whose special services governmental agencies might have a need.
