Expansion Program Planned for Hospital

Announcement of a county-wide fund drive to relieve the desperate situation concerning Oakland County Hospitals, is made today by Mr. Henry Srispps Booth of Bloomfield Hills, General Chairman of the Drive Committee. According to Mr. Booth, the Drive will be launched Thursday Noon, February 18th at a Campaign Starting Dinner at the Elks Club Ball Room in Pontiac. This Drive is for \$100,000 for the expansion of the facilities at St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital. Assisting Mr. Booth in the Campaign are more than four score of leading and prominent citizens thro out the county, including some fifty District Chairmen in each of the communities and townships.

It is purposed that this money will increase the number of beds available from 175 to 275.

"It has been known for the past few years that a critical situation exists concerning our hospitals in Oakland County. For a considerable length of time the hospitals in this county have been overcrowded with no reserve rooms should there occur some disaster or epidemic in our communities. Both major hospitals in Oakland County are now operating about 34% beyond their capacity. The demands for service have been constantly increasing during the past year and one-half. It has come to a crisis which affects the future safety of all persons in our County needing hospitalization, nursing and clinic service", outlined Mr. Booth.

While the St. Joseph Mercy Hospital is owned and operated by the Sisters of Mercy, no one is ever denied care or service.

Legionnaires, World War Veterans Register

The American Legion working thru its 11,715 posts is going to register all of its 1,078,119 members, if possible, for national defense service. Unaffiliated World War veterans also will be asked to register. The registration will be entirely, voluntary.

National Commander Milo J. Warren has proclaimed Saturday, February 22, the 20th anniversary of the birth of George Washington, as national defense registration day for all Legionnaires and unaffiliated World War veterans who care to do so.

On that day every American Legion post in the country will ask its membership and local World War veterans generally to fill out a questionnaire. It will chronicle every Legionnaire's capabilities and talents which could be used in national defense. These indices will enable the American Legion quickly to locate any member or veteran for whose special services governmental agencies might have a need.

The Clarkston Post No. 68 of The American Legion in this city will undertake to register all Legionnaires and unaffiliated World War veterans in this community and surrounding area.

"This is a summons for possible important service to God and Country whom we served as young men in 1917-18," Commander Baynes of the local post said. "I feel certain that every Legionnaire and World War veterans generally will welcome this opportunity of perhaps doing another bit for their country. We do not expect to be called for active military service. Most of us are beyond that age.

"I urge every Legionnaire and other interested World War veterans in this community to register on February 22."

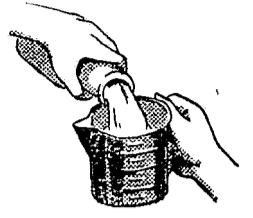

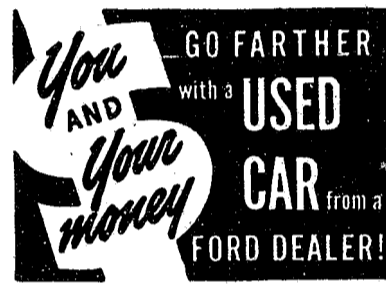

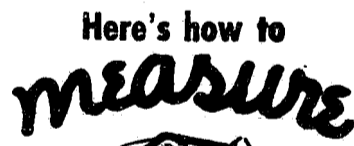

SMALL FACTORIES GIVEN ATTENTION

Every Productive Facility Sought to Aid Defense

A national productive census, to provide a nationwide inventory of machines and facilities, is now being taken under orders from William S. Knudsen and Sidney Hillman. Donald F. Walker, Manager of the Chamber of Commerce of Pontiac has been put in charge of the survey in Oakland County.
