Relative to Opening and Closing of the Polls


Public Acts 1929—No. 306—Chapter VIII Section 1. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continued open until six o'clock in the afternoon and no longer: PROVIDED, That in town-ships the board of inspectors of election may, in its discretion, adjourn the polls at twelve o'clock noon, for one hour, and that the township board in townships and the legislative body in cities and villages may, by resolution, provide that the polls shall be opened at six o'clock in the forenoon and may also provide that the polls shall be kept open not later than eight o'clock in the evening of the same day. Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the

hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote. The polls of said election will open at 7 o'clock a. m., or as soon thereafter as may be, and remain open until 6 o'clock p. m., Eastern Standard time, on said day of election. PERCY CRAVEN, Clerk of said Village.






