## FARM HAND FALLS AND BREAKS NECK

**Accident Happened at Walter Marsh's Barn in Groveland**

A fall from a haymow in a barn on the farm of Walter Marsh, 2474 Dixie Highway, in Groveland, resulted fatally for Howard Guthrie, 66 years old, about 6:30 p. m. Friday last. He evidently struck on his head on the barn floor and broke his neck, although no one saw the accident. He was not dead when discovered but died before reaching General Hospital in Pontiac, where he was taken by officers called on the case.

The body was taken to Holly where funeral services were held on Monday at 2 p. m. Rev. C. J. Sutton of Drayton Plains officiated and burial was in Wixom.

Mr. Guthrie had been employed at the Marsh farm only three days. He was born in West Virginia July 24, 1875, but lived in Michigan nearly all his life, near Milford the greater part of the time.

He is survived by two daughters, Estus Guthrie, 24, who is secretary of the Milford schools, and Alice Guthrie, 22, an employee in the county treasurer's office in Pontiac.

## Ellis Home Open To Red Cross

The Ellis home at 1931 Dixie Highway is a well known local landmark and will be an excellent community center for those interested in sewing for the war refugees in England and Canada.

Assisted by Mrs. E. L. Rundell, of Davisburg, Mrs. Ellis is planning to have her home open Monday to Saturday from 10 to 4 o'clock for any individual or group who may wish to sew.

Hand sewing as baby layettes, caps, booties, blankets and diapers, is now available either to be sewed at the Ellis home or may be taken out by a club to be finished in their own group.

Special plea is made by the Red Cross for women to knit in order that that Oakland county quota of 2100 sweaters will be completed by May 15.

Mrs. Dorothea Gaynor, of Davisburg, local knitting chairman, has on hand yarn in blue, maroon and brown for children's, women's and men's sweaters with detailed instructions for each garment to be knitted. This yarn and directions will be given to any woman who will volunteer her time to knit for the American Red Cross.

## For Homemakers

Tips for handling frozen meats in locker storage are apparent in research conducted recently at Michigan State College. The pointers include what type of wrapping paper to use and what temperatures are best.

Tests sponsored by the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station at the college indicated that recommended cellophane permitted no moisture loss when pork was stored for four months at a temperature of 5 degrees Fahrenheit. 40 lb. wrapping paper waxed inside only, the moisture loss was less than one per cent. Nearly five percent moisture was lost with 50-pound brown wrapping paper.

Rural and urban meat users, alike, can take one tip from the research. The college staff members recommend wrapping meat for frozen storage so that meat-size packages are readily available. When the wrapping paper is used, with the waxed side inside, the outside can be used for labels indicating type of meat, date frozen, name and locker number.

Another point in favor of proper wrapping is that if no moisture losses occur, there also will be less chance of the meat absorbing foreign flavors and odors. The wrapping paper also should not crack or become brittle at low temperature and should not absorb blood, water, oil or grease or impart flavor to the meat inclosed.

General directions for handling frozen meat from the selection and slaughter of the animals to the preparation for the table are included in a new publication. The material is printed suitable for tacking up in a kitchen or storage locker. The title is "Extension Bulletin 223, Preservation of Meats and Poultry in Frozen-Food-Locker." s"

**ORDINANCE NO. 32**  
**VILLAGE OF CLARKSTON**  
**AN ORDINANCE REGULATING**  
**TRAILERS AND TRAILER CAMPS**  
**AND PROVIDING PENALTIES**  
**FOR THE VIOLATION OF**  
**THIS ORDINANCE**  
**THE VILLAGE OF CLARKSTON**  
**ORDAINS:**  
Section 1. Definitions.  
Section 2. Location of House Trailer Camps.  
Section 3. House Trailer Camps.  
Section 4. House Trailer Camps, Facilities Required.  
Section 5. Violations and Penalties.  
Section 6.  
Section 7.  
Section 8.

Camp shall be filed with the Village Clerk on such forms as shall be prescribed by him. The application shall be accompanied with a plan of the proposed House Trailer Camp. No such application shall be accepted by the Village Clerk unless it is accompanied by a petition signed by 80% of the property owners owning property within 1,000 feet of the proposed site of the House Trailer Camp. shall be paid before any such license is issued.  
(d) A fee in the amount of \$25.00 shall be issued.  
(e) The application shall be approved by the Health Officer and the Village Council before any such license shall be issued.  
Section 4. House Trailer Camps, Facilities Required.  
(a) House Trailer Camps shall: Be enclosed within a substantial fence not less than 5 feet in height. Provide clearly defined lots for each trailer of not less than 850 square feet in area. Be provided with its own septic tank and driven well with tested drinking water and all connected to each assigned lot for trailers. Provide not less than 1 toilet for each sex for each ten trailers provided for in the camp. Be operated in a clean and sanitary manner and in accordance with the rules and regulations determined by the Health Officer. Be open to inspection by the Health Officer at any reasonable time.  
Section 5. Violations and Penalties.  
(a) Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof before any court of competent jurisdiction, be punished by a fine of not to exceed \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the Oakland County Jail for a period of not to exceed 90 days, or both such fine and imprisonment, within the discretion of the court.  
Section 6.  
If any section, sub-section, sentence, clause, and phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be void, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The Council hereby declares that it would have passed the ordinance and each section, sub-section, sentence, clause, and phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more of the sections, sub-sections, sentences, clauses, and phrases may be declared void.  
Section 7.  
All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed insofar as they conflict with the provisions of this ordinance.  
Section 8.  
This ordinance is hereby declared to be necessary for the preservation of the health, safety, welfare, and property of the people of the Village of Clarkston.  
This ordinance shall take effect April 29, 1941.
