State Tax Licenses Ready in July

Over 90 thousand renewal applications for new 1941-42 sales tax licenses have been received by the State Board of Tax Administration offices, according to an announcement made this week by Sales Tax Director Louis M. Nims.

The new green and white window stickers will be mailed in July together with the 1941-42 return forms. It is expected that the huge task of addressing, folding and mailing of some 90 thousand "books" can be accomplished without hiring additional help. The 1940-41 window stickers now in use will be honored until August 1.

The July mailing date for both license stickers and return forms will eliminate duplicate mailing costs and provide retailers with complete materials required for the ensuing fiscal year.

Poultry Ranks High

Poultry rates second in agricultural production within the state. An estimated 10 cents of every dollar originates in poultry in Michigan. Even at that, it is pointed out, consumers purchase and eat more eggs than flocks within the state can produce. In Detroit alone, the egg consumption annually is estimated at 519,250,000 eggs. When farmers get one cent extra a dozen, Michigan farm income in a year increases one million dollars.

Conservation Note

Outfitting of secluded state forest camp grounds for the 1941 season has begun, and all 40 principal sites, accommodating two to 35 parties each, will be ready for use by June 1, the conservation department's forestry division announced today.

Scattered through 13 state forests, the sites are supplied with only the essentials for comfortable camping—fireplace, well, tables and benches and sanitary facilities. They appeal particularly to tourists wishing to get into wilderness areas away from main highways. Visitors' registers show some tourists return to the same camping spot year after year.

Many campsites have well developed hikers' trails and most of them are located along streams or on lake shores where either swimming or fishing is available. In Houghton Lake state forest are camps for canoeists on the upper Muskegon river.

More than 33,000 signed guest registers in state forest camp grounds last season, and actual test counts have shown that less than half the site users sign. Besides the 40 principal campgrounds there are many small camping sites and picnic spots in state forests equipped with tables and stoves.

Impressed by a talk by Conservation Officer Leonard Bloomquist of Watersmeet, Berrien county, school children here each donated a penny for a fund to buy cracked corn and oats to feed birds. Carrying their campaign to their homes, the children interested their mothers and bread crusts were added to the bird's menu. A group of Indiana tourists who camp near here each year heard of the project and donated \$10.
