Highway Travel Is at High Peak

As the touring season went into high gear last week, State Highway Commissioner G. Donald Kennedy reported highway travel up 30 per cent over that of 1940 and travel across the straits at an all-time peak. Traffic tabulations from the Straits revealed that the state-owned boats transported a total of 10,538 automobiles over Memorial Day weekend, as compared with 3,716 for the same period last year. This was an increase of 184 per cent. "This upsurge in holiday traffic bears out our predictions," Kennedy stated, "that Michigan this year will witness a banner gasoline travel season with a total of more than \$425,000,000 expected to be spent here on highway holidays." **SUMMER BRINGS FORTH VITAMINS**

**Fruits and Vegetables Furnish Abundant Supply**

It is easier to get a supply of vitamins in the summer. One of the most plentiful is vitamin C, present in most of the vegetables and many of the fruits soon in the peak of harvest for the summer.

Members of the home economics extension staff at Michigan State College remind the cooks, however, that vitamin C is elusive. Foods must be fresh and properly cooked, if cooked, to retain a plentiful supply in the food on the table.

Vegetables offering a goodly supply of vitamin C include new cabbage, lima beans, green peas, summer squash or any of the leafy vegetables. Plump red tomatoes, cantaloups, raspberries and watermelons or lemons are other sources.

Most important of the cooking rules is to use as little water as possible

and to serve this cooking water with the vegetables. The vitamin C dissolves in the cooking water. Losses occur when the water is drained off and discarded, when vegetables are cooked too long or when soda is added to the cooking water.

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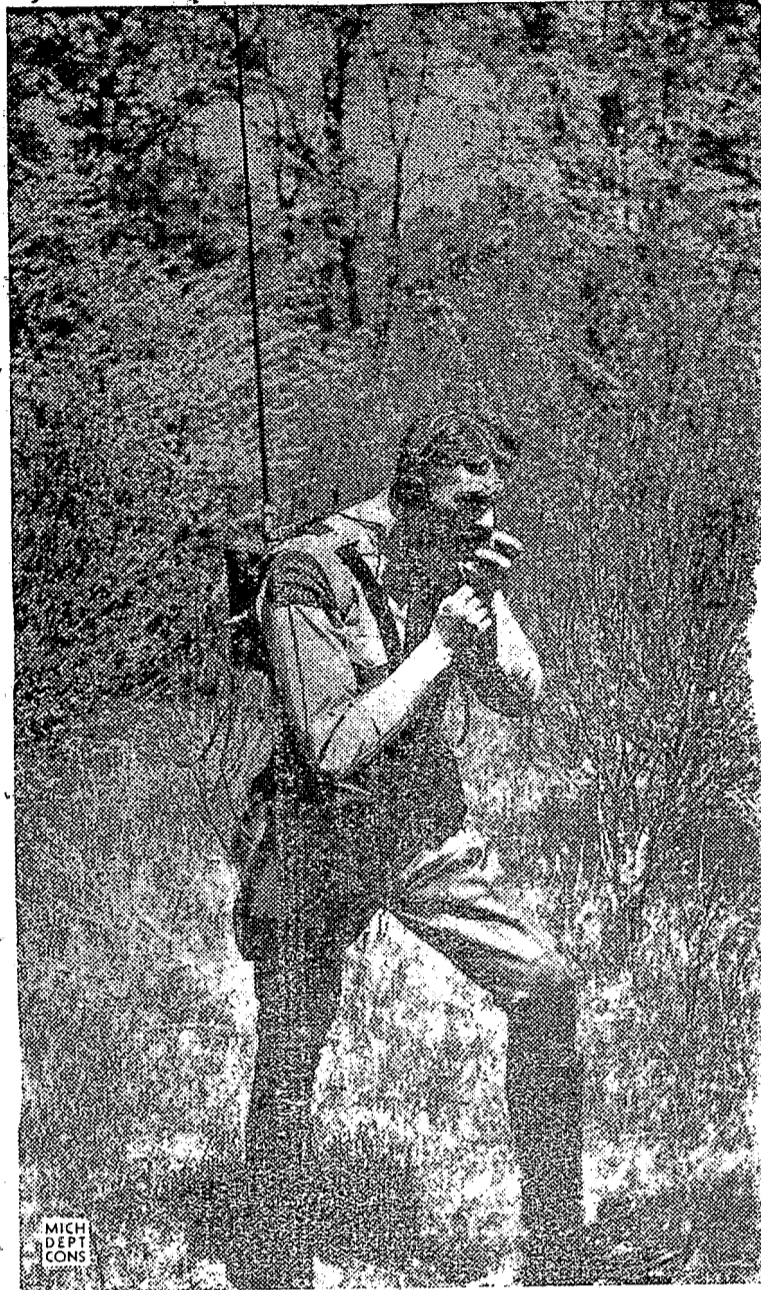
