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41 County Schools Participate in NYA Program

By providing part-time jobs, the National Youth Administration will enable approximately 17,000 high school students in the state to continue their education during the 1941-42 academic year. It was announced today by Michigan NYA administrator Orin W. Kaye.

Approximately 595 high schools are participating in this program. The schools are: Clarkston High, Drayton Plains High, Auburn Hills High, Berkley High, Hazel Park High, Lake Orion High, Milford Road Agricultural School, New Hudson Rural Agricultural School, Novi Public Schools, Mary School, Orchard Lake, Ortonville High, Oxford High, Rochester High, Waller Lake Consolidated Schools, Waterford Schools, and Wixom Schools.

A total of 30,412 part-time jobs will be available in the NYA program. These jobs will be available to students who are currently attending high school and who are at least 17 years of age.
