High School Team Finishes Strong South Lyon Defeated 18-0 Our football-playing reporters failed us, and we had to call upon "Doc"

to write the story of the game: "Don Appleton, acting as captain, won the toss and chose to defend the north goal, to take advantage of the northeast wind. South Lyon elected to receive. Clarkston held, and South Lyon was forced to kick. The Clarkston line rushed the kicker and he punted out of bounds on the 50 yard line. The remainder of the first half was a see-saw affair between the South Lyon 20 and 50 yard stripes. Clarkston failed to capitalize on several scoring chances, because of the wet, soggy ball, which caused several fumbles and made it all but impossible to pass. The score at the end of the first half stood at 0-0.

"Because of the weather conditions it was decided to resume the game without the customary 15-minute intermission. A long pass from Bill O'Roark to Edwin Ross, with Edwin making a nice run after the catch, resulted in the first score of the game. After making the catch Edward found himself surrounded by tacklers; he reversed his field, picked up his interference, and ran for a touchdown. Again the extra point was missed. Score at end of 3rd quarter, 12-0.

"Near the middle of the 4th quarter Clarkston made its last touchdown. Starting from a box formation. Dave Wainman went around right end, behind nice interference, and raced 4 yards for the touchdown. The remainder of the game was spent deep in South Lyon's territory, but South Lyon managed to keep us from scoring.

"South Lyon used most of its secondary right behind the line on defense. This made it hard for Clarkston to use its running attack. It was an ideal set-up for passes but passes were difficult to complete. It is believed by the local followers that a much higher score would have resulted on a dry field.


